Junior Membership Requirements at OCC

If you have a child who is 10 years old (or older) who wants to play on one of our junior volleyball teams or paddle for the Club this summer, they should apply now for their own membership.

The advantages of membership for a 10 year old are many. They have to learn to live within a budget, they need to talk to you about how their bill will be paid, they can sign their own Snack Bar chit, find out what's OK and what isn't, get their own locker, and so forth.

And even more important, with membership in the Outrigger Canoe Club limited, they sustain our membership in our family base. Many children now applying for membership are second, third and even fourth generation members of the OCC.

Another advantage of applying for membership prior to reaching your child's 14th birthday, or within 90 days after the parent becomes a member, is that the membership fee is waived.

The usual initiation fee for Junior members, whose parents are members, is \$150. Monthly dues is \$7.50.

You may obtain the membership application form from the Executive Office. Two sponsors (voting members for the past three years) are required. They cannot be close relatives. Upon completion of the application, the applicant is posted for 30 days.

After the posting period, the Admissions and Membership Committee will schedule interviews with you, your child and the sponsors.

Also at the meeting, they selected two local charities to help.


bership, the child may only come to the Club two times a month as a guest.



T-shirts, tank tops, athletic clothes and/or swim wear, beach sandals and rubber thongs are not acceptable and will not be permitted.


In the Lounge, casual dress is permitted. T-shirts and athletic clothes may be worn, upper torso cover is required for ladies and gentlemen.



Sponsoring a Candidate for Membership


Sometime during your life as a member of the Outrigger Canoe Club, you will be asked to sponsor a friend, business associate or acquaintance for membership in the Club.

We recommend that you only sponsor people you know very well. Our Club is limited in size and we want people who will integrate well into our lifestyle.

To sponsor a member, you must have been a voting member of the Club for three years, and may not be a close relative, member of the Board of Directors or on the A&M Committee.

As a sponsor, it's your job to pick up a membership application for your candidate from the Executive Office.

The responsibilities of the sponsor and co-sponsor are equal. The co-sponsor may have to step in and be the sponsor should the original sponsor have to step down due to a change in mem-



bership status, or election to the Board or A&M Committee, or unavailability for the interview.

Remember, your candidate's application is not complete until you complete the sponsor sheet and turn it into the Executive Office. Only after this occurs, does your candidate go on the list to be posted. Currently, application for regular membership is taking 36 months.

After your candidate has been posted, the A&M Committee will schedule an interview with your candidate. It is your job to notify the potential member of the date of the interview. Please call the Executive Office to confirm the appointment.

You must appear before the A&M Committee with your candidate. If your candidate is married, his/her spouse must also attend the interview. For juniors, whose parents are not members, the committee requires that both parents appear with the child at the interview.

When you arrive at the Club on interview day, check in at the Front Desk with your candidate so we'll know you're here. Then wait in the Lobby to be called.

We suggest that you be punctual and properly attired in business clothing

when you appear before the A&M Committee. T-shirts and shorts are not considered appropriate attire.

At the interview, be prepared to discuss your candidate, both personally and professionally. If you don't know enough about them to do this, then you shouldn't be their sponsor.

Tell us how long you've known the candidate, how you've known them (socially, business, family, etc.), how they will contribute to the Club, their athletic and social interests, other activities they're involved in, their profession or business interests, their family, etc.

Invite them to the Club prior to their interview and let them see first hand what we're like. Get to know them better and ask them any of the questions the Committee is likely to ask you about them.

One of your jobs as a sponsor, is to notify your candidate on the Board's decision on their membership. You must be prepared if your sponsor someone for membership, especially if it's for business reasons only, to tell them that they have been rejected for membership.

OCC's Best Chefs

The following recipe is enthusiastically shared by Karen and Cale Carson, who found it in the Moosewood Cookbook. The cookbook is produced by a cooperative that runs a wonderful health food restaurant in Ithaca, New York.

The restaurant is appropriately called the Moosewood Restaurant and Karen, who went to Cornell, as did her son, Chris, has eaten there and raves about it.

Karen suggests doubling this recipe and making it in a large quiche pan.

Cauliflower-Cheese Pie

Crust:

2 cups, packed, grated raw potato 1/2 tsp. salt 1 egg, beaten

1/4 cup grated onion

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Set the freshly-grated potato in a colander over a bowl. Salt it and leave it for 10 minutes. Then squeeze out the excess water (which can be used for soup stock) and add it to the remaining ingredients. Pat it into a well-oiled 9-inch pie pan, building up the sides of the crust with lightly floured fingers. Bake for 40-45 minutes until browned. After the first 30 minutes brush the crust with a little oil to crispen it.

Filling:

1 heaping, packed cup grated cheddar cheese

1 medium cauliflower, broken into small flowerets

1 medium clove crushed garlic

Start thinking now about the 1991 paddling season. Signups will begin next month. Watch for the date and place on the Bulletin Board in the Tunnel.


If you're not in training, now's the time to get started. If you're not in shape, start by walking. Visit the Fitness Center and ask how you can begin a program to get started.

OCC Athletic Locker Procedures

One of the best reasons to be a Club member is the locker room and shower facilities that are available after swimming, running, paddling, volleyball, lifting or whatever athletic endeavors you enjoy.

Lockers are available in the Senior Men, Senior Women, Junior Boys and Junior Girls locker rooms for permanent assignment or day use.

All classes of membership (except Nonresident) who are in good standing and residents of Oahu are eligible for permanent locker assignment.

Getting a Locker

Club management maintains a waiting list of eligible members who want lockers. Lockers are offered in turn to the top name on the list, regardless of their permanent membership classification.

Locker Preference

When available, a locker will be offered to the first name on the list. If the person does not choose that particular locker, their name will be returned to first on the list, and the locker will be offered, in turn, to the next waiting person until someone selects the available locker.

If you wish to take the locker temporarily, but prefer another locker size, you may have the available locker and your name will be maintained first on the waiting list for a locker of your preference.

When changing from Junior (under 18) to Senior status (over 18), you may temporarily retain your junior locker until a senior locker is available.

However, you must put your name on the senior locker waiting list. If the senior locker that becomes available is not your preference, you must take it in order to leave the junior locker room. Your name will be retained on top of the senior waiting list for a locker of your preference.

Change in Membership Status

Once you have obtained a locker, it is yours to use, regardless of your change in membership status from Associate, Regular or Nonresident A, as long as you use it within the year and respond to non-usage correspondence described under the section on retention of lockers. If you were a resident and become a Nonresident-A, you may wish to give up your locker or share with somebody.

If your membership is terminated for delinquency or other reasons, your locker may be retained in your name for 90 days (three months), giving you the opportunity for reinstatement.

If you are reinstated within 90 days, you will have your locker. After 90 days, your locker will be emptied and released to another on the waiting list.

If you are later reinstated, you will have to place your name on the bottom of the waiting list. You will not have a preferred waiting status.

Retention of Lockers

Use of a locker is a privilege. Nonuse of a locker can be grounds for revocation of that privilege.

On January 1 of each year, a letter is placed in each locker inquiring if the rental occupant still wants to retain that locker and if so, to return the letter of intent to the locker attendant.

On April 30 (after four months), all lockers are opened and those rental occupants with the intent letter still inside will receive a letter from the manager requesting release of the locker due to non-usage, or a statement in writing of the occupant's wish to retain the locker.

Those who have not responded to the Manager's letter by June 30 (after two months), will have the contents of their locker removed and disposed of and locker fees will be deleted from their Club bill.

Locker Name/Occupant

The occupant of the locker is indicated on the locker list and is the person billed for the locker. You may have only one locker.

A spouse holding a "Special Guest Card" may have a locker. It is billed to the permanent sponsoring member's account.

The names of other Club members using your locker on a shared basis must be supplied in writing to the attendant or the key to the locker will not be released to those members. The person assigned to the locker is billed for the locker.

Sharing is encouraged but by personal arrangement. If there are problems with the other members sharing your locker, you are responsible for your locker and must handle those problems.

Day Lockers

Day lockers are available from the attendants for one day use for any classification of membership and guests. A signed Club charge slip will be made for the applicable fee. This locker must be cleared by the end of the day.

Care of Lockers

You are responsible for the interior care of your locker. Do not store food, perishables or wet items in your locker.

Laundry Services

If you wish towels or athletic clothing laundered, sew or write your locker number on the item. It will be washed and returned to your locker by the attendant.

Both an alphabet letter indicating which locker room, and your locker number, must be used. Example, M201, W111, G16, B2.

Use of locker laundry service is at your own risk. The Club is not responsible for lost or damaged personal items.

Liability

The Club assumes no responsibility or liability for personal valuables or other belongings stored in lockers or left in the locker rooms.

Violations

Members abusing their locker, storing offensive material, delinquent in paying bills or not responding to locker usage notices could lose the privilege of having a locker.
