4. "World Cat," 44' ketch rig-Juergen Wagner, Ham-

burg Yacht Club, Germany.

 "Tri-Star," 41' sloop rig trimaran—Ed Horstmann, California Yacht Club. (All boats have 6-, 7- or 8men crew.)

On or about July 11 make it a point to come to the club for the finish at the Diamond Head buoy. The first boat across will be towed into the Outrigger lagoon and accorded its due honors. There will be leis for the captain and crew and, of course, victory Mai Tai's. A party for all crews in will follow on the same evening.

All the cats will be moored at the cub for one night, then sail to the Waikiki Yacht Club for the awards banquet on July 16. Outrigger will present a koa bowl trophy to the winner and the Catamaran Association will award
