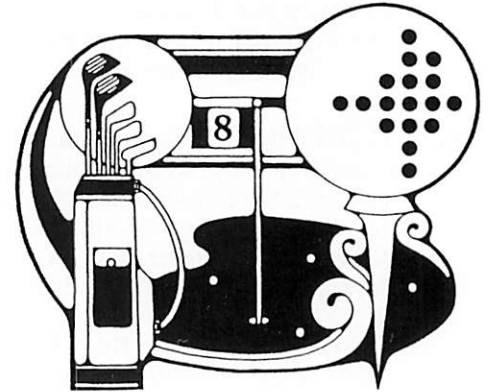

Golf is perhaps the last remaining sport in which vestiges of sportsmanship and etiquette remain. We do not see players screaming at the umpires and referees as they do in tennis and basketball. Nor do we see players get into fist fights as they do in baseball, basketball, football and ice hockey.

When was the last time you saw a player in any other sport than golf calling a penalty on himself for a rule infraction no one but he himself was aware of.

The rules and etiquette of golf have come down from the Royal and Ancient in Scotland from more than 100 years ago.

They are, of course, based on basic common courtesy. We don't dally on the course and hold up the players behind us. We make it a point to keep up with those ahead. Much as it pains us, if we take 10 or 15 strokes on a hole, that's the number we put on the score card.

The slow play by one foursome at the Club's Leilehua tournament caused extreme embarrassment to Club Golf Chairman Jim Hammons. He has written a letter of apology to the General Manager of the U.S. Army Support Command. It is hoped that the slow play will not cause the Club to be barred from further play at the Army course.

Hammons has also written a letter of admonition to the four players involved in

the slow play.

It is hoped that all Club players will make it a point to observe this basic rule of the golf course.

Note that all players will be required to check in at the covered lanai of the Snack Bar/Pro Shop at 12 noon.

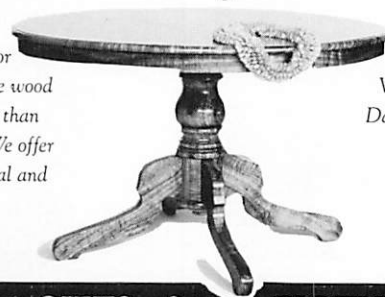
