## Lanikai best at channel surfing

The outrigger canoe club wins the Molokai-to-Oahu race in record time

Lanikai Canoe Club paddlers proved their point by finishing first in the 44th annual Bankoh Molokai Hoe, the men's outrigger canoe race from Molokai to Waikiki.

Hawaii paddlers can beat the best of the foreign crews.

That feat hadn't been accomplished in four years but yesterday Lanikai, in its first Molokai Hoe victory in 21 years, covered the wave-swept 41 miles from Hale O Lono Harbor to Waikiki's Fort DeRussy Beach in a course record of four hours, 53 minutes and three seconds.

"We caught some fabulous surfing rides, where our entire crew screamed and shouted for more," said John

Foti of the five to eight-foot waves.

Lanikai topped two-time defending champ Faaa of Tahiti, which finished second yesterday, by a comfortable 8:36. It also bettered Faaa's course mark set last year by 2:24.

"I was 10 years old when, in 1974, Lanikai won its last Molokai race," said Kalani Irvine, a member of yesterday's winning team.

"It was a thrill then as a spectator aboard an escort boat, and a huge thrill today as a participant and winner."

Added Lanikai steersman Jim Foti: "We brought the trophy back to Hawaii where it belongs. We also returned pride to our Lanikai community."

Outrigger Canoe Club of Honolulu finished third in 5:03:00. Fourth place went to Waikiki Surf Club, also of Honolulu, (5:09:08) and fifth to Outrigger of Australia in 5:10:58.

A record 92 entries (88 finishers) took part.

infractions at the start, some standings might change.

At least 10 teams, including the top three finishers, were noted by officials to have improperly made crew changes after the start.

Teams found in violation are expected to have 10 minutes added to their respective finishing times.

If the top three teams are found guilty, Lanikai would still win the race but its record would be erased. Fourth finisher Waikiki Surf Club, which was not penalized, would move up to second place.

"All results are unofficial until hearings are completed," said Joan Malama, president of the governing Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association.

Said Foti: "Lanikai didn't cheat. We were legal in every way. We deserved the win, and the race record."

Faaa and Outrigger also claimed innocence.

"Too bad canoe racing doesn't have a video replay like at National Football League games," said Tom Conner, Faaa's Hawaii steersman the past three years.

Soon after the start, the race developed into a three-boat battle between Lanikai. Faaa and Outrigger. The hard-paddling winners broke free about 20 minutes past Molokai's Laau Point never to be headed.

"Lanikai's win was no fluke," Conner said.

"Their paddlers are strong, focused and well-trained. Our problem? We needed more practice time in island waters."

The race start was congested and confused, mostly because of the large fleet and the blustery weather. Once free of congestion, the fleet paddled into some of the roughest waters in years.

"Great surfing conditions for outriggers," said steersman Kala Kukea of the seventh place Hawaii Canoe/Kayak Team.

"We caught waves resulting in rides you wouldn't believe."

The Lanikai crew, consisting of Bo Eastabrook, Rich Lambert, Bob Nottage, Rock Owens, Mike Pedersen, Mike Smith, brothers John and Jim Foti and Irvine, paddled a Bradley fiberglass racer.

Outrigger Canoe Club, team 2, topped the six-boat koa division. finishing 21st overall in 5:36:23.

Australia's Mooloolaba, with its 10th place finish in 5:20:09, led the masters, 35 years and older, while Honolulu's Anuenue 2 topped the senior masters (45 years and over) finishing 30th in 5:47:12.

Nike Hungary, a crew consisting of European flat-water racers placed 28th in 5:44.
