Defending champs back in focus for Molokai Hoe

The Lanikai Canoe Club's best preparation for tomorrow's Bankoh Molokai Hoe probably came three weeks ago at the Skippy Kamakawiwo'ole Race. It lost

The sixth-place finish at the last long-distance canoe race may prove to be the slap in the face Lanikai needed, Now, Lanikai enters tomorrow's prestigious race with an angry crew.

"That probably was the best thing that could have happened to us," said Lanikai coach Gale Berengue. "It got everybody re-focused. I would say we're as ready now as we'll ever be. A month ago, I don't know if I could say that."

Dark horse teams include Tui Tonga, Maohi Nui, Sydney Outrigger and Rocky Outrigger. Tui Tonga will be comprised of world-class kayak paddlers from Hawaii and the Mainland. Maohi Nui is another crew from Tahiti rumored to be as strong as Faa'a, just not as experienced. Sydney and Rocky represent Australia's best.

NOTES: Team Kupuna, a group of paddlers from the Big Island, will defy age barriers by entering a crew in the senior masters division. Although the division is for men 45 and over, all of Kupuna's paddlers are over 55, including 68-year-old Jerry Halversen. ... A record 105 crews are registered to compete in tomorrow's race. The previous record was last year's 90.

... The course record for the 41-mile race from Hale O Lono Harbor, Molokai, to Duke Kahanamoku Beach, Waikiki is 4 hours, 53 minutes, 3 seconds. set by Lanikai last year. ... Other notable crews in this year's race include: Kalama Malolo, which is an entry from Johnston Island; Jericho, Rainbow Outrigger and False Creek, which are teams from Canada; and the Columbia River Pol Boys, a crew formed by Oregon native Brian Mulvaney that will consist primarily of paddlers from the
