THIRD RACE.

Six-paddle canoe. First prize, \$30; second, \$15. Course—From line between outer pile buoys to judges' boat. Entries—Kalmookalani, entered by A. C. Wall; Lei Ilima, Lei Aloha; Aa, Outrigger Club; Kalei and Nialauli, Kamehameha Aquatic Club.

There were three starters: Kalmookalani, Aa, and Nialauli, the former entered by A. C. Wall, the Aa by the Outrigger Club, and the Nialauli by the Kamehameha Aquatic Club. The Aa, manned by Harry Steiner, W. Cottrell, E. Melanphy, David Center and Gen Genover, and steered by Rusty Brown, led all the way and won easily by 5 lengths. A great race ensued for second money between the Kalmookalani and the Nialauli. The Kalmookalani's crew just won by a quarter of a length, their younger paddlers outlasting the men in the rival canoe. The Nialauli finished a length and a half behind the Kalmookalani. The Aa was loaned the Outrigger Club boys by Prince Cupid.

The time of the winning canoe was 4 minutes, 33 1/2 seconds.

FOURTH RACE.

Freshman six-oared barge (sliding seat). Prize, \$25 trophy. Course—From judges' boat to and around flag opposite spar buoy, keeping same on port side in turning, thence back to start. Entries—Mytie, entered by the Myrtle Boat Club; Healanl, Healanl Yacht and Boat Club.

Another runaway for the Myrtles who won by a dozen lengths after holding the lead all the way. The Myrtles jumped off in the lead and passing the Channel wharf were two lengths to the good. They made the turn some six lengths ahead of the Healanls, and finished as stated, rowed out. Of eleven Freshmen races rowed on Regatta Day, the Myrtles have now won ten and the Healanls one.

The times were: Myrtles, 11 minutes, 46 1/2 seconds; Healanls, 12 minutes, 34 seconds.

FIFTH RACE.

Four-paddle canoe. First prize, \$20; second, \$10. Course—Same as No. 3. Entries—Lei Ililima, entered by Lei Ilima, entered by Lei Aloha; Kalmookalani, A. C. Wall; Flying Fish, W. F. Dillingham; Aa, Outrigger Club; Kalei and Nialauli, Kamehameha Aquatic Club.

Six starters, as follows: Lei Ililima, Kalmookalani, Flying Fish, Aa, Kalei, Nialauli. A hard race was won by the Aa, entered by the Outrigger Club by a length from Nialauli which finished a three lengths in front of Kalmookalani. The Aa's outlasted the natives and beat them at their own game.

It was a very pretty race and the finish created great excitement. Indeed, but for the canoe races the day's sport would have been of a very tame description.

The canoes kept well bunched until half way over the course, when the Aa, Nialauli and Kalmookalani drew away from the remainder and contested the issue with the result as follows: The Nialauli barely escaped getting second money in the six-paddle canoe race.

SIXTH RACE.

Senior pair-oared boats (sliding seats). Prize, \$20 trophy. Course—From makal end of Chamae wharf to judges' boat. Entries—Margaret H., entered by Myrtle Boat Club; Healanl, Healanl Yacht and Boat Club.

Myrtles made it three straight by taking this race. The Myrtles led all the way but the Healanl pair were coming strong at the finish and would have won but for poor steering on the part of the Healanl crew.

The race was won by a bare two lengths in 1 minute, 39 1/2 seconds. The crews were:

SEVENTH RACE.

Good Time, Lanakila and Malkai Fine started. The canoes kept well together with Good Time at the head of affairs until the finish, the race being won by Good Time by two lengths. A desperate struggle for second money resulted in Malkai Fine losing 5 lengths to Lanakila by half a length. The winner's time was 1 minute, 57 seconds.

Good Time was entered by Leialoha and Malkai Fine and Lanakila by the Kamehameha Aquatic Club. At 12:30 an hour's intermission was taken.

Course—From stake boat off entrance of channel to judges' boat, keeping between buoys marking channel and passing lighthouse buoy on mauka side. Entries—F, entered by U. S. Tennessee; U. S. S. Washington; B, U. S. S. California; R, U. S. S. South Dakota; V, U. S. S. West Virginia; M, U. S. S. Maryland; I, U. S. S. Pennsylvania; J, U. S. S. Colorado.

TENTH RACE.

Sailing canoe race. First prize, \$15; second, \$10. Course—From judges' boat off channel, keeping between the

piles and buoys, round spar buoy and back to start. Entries—Lei Ilima, entered by Lei Aloha; Kalmookalani; A. C. Wall; Alabama; A. M. Brown; Unknown; Outrigger Club; Kalei, Kamehameha Aquatic Club.

(U. S. Cruisers)—Twelve-oared racing cutters. Prize, \$25 cup. Course—Same as No. 9. Entries—F, entered by U. S. S. Tennessee; U. S. S. Washington; R, U. S. S. California; U. S. S. South Dakota; V, U. S. S. West Virginia; I, U. S. S. Pennsylvania; J, U. S. S. Colorado.

TWELFTH RACE.

ed their way through the press, sending out huge waves which made the row boats and other small craft rock from side to side.

Through the courtesy of Admiral Sebee, one of the big launches of the fleet, flying the five of clubs, acted as the guard boat which patrolled the course during the events of the day. Given full authority to act where it seemed necessary, the patrol kept the course clear from all interference with the racers.

The boat club, as usual, held open house during the day. Here the staunchest adherents of rowing could be found and hardly a single person could be noticed who was not qualified or at least who thought he or she was not qualified, to discuss the merits of the various boats, from the standpoint of an expert. The largest crowd was found at the Healanl's home, where the clubhouse was crowded to its utmost capacity. The building was gorgeously decorated with blue and white bunting and Kaai's quintet played through the day while the guests and members of the Healanl club danced during the intervals between the races. Refreshments were served during the noon intervals, the members of the club acting as one large committee of entertainment. The entire work of handling and entertaining was in charge of Sam Mabeona and a corps of assistants who acquitted themselves most creditably.

Myrtles, with their spacious launch on the modern story of the clubhouse, were visited by over 1000 of their friends. The posts supporting the roof were draped with red and white and these colors carried out the scheme of decoration throughout the club. The cabinets containing the many cups and other prizes which have been carried away by the Myrtles in the course of successful campaigning, attracted a great deal of attention from the visitors and the older members of the club were on hand to tell of how this race was won or that one was lost years ago. Sonny Cunha provided the music for the Myrtles and the cool breeze which came in through the lanai made dancing comfortably cool even during the warmest hours of the day. The committee of the club which had in charge of this feature consisted of Harry Bailey, chairman, Kenneth Brown, Charles Sullivan and Henry Williams.

As was only to be expected the daintiest and coziest of the clubhouses was

that of the Kunalu Club Club. The pretty little structure was decorated with green and has never been more charming, than this morning, when, filled to the limit by a number of the society girls of the city and their friends, the strains of Sam Nalao's quintet were inviting all to dance. There were few who could withstand the invitation, and each pause in the program meant a moment for those who know the joy of dancing to Hawaiian music. At noon a delicious luncheon, consisting of light refreshments, was served by the young ladies of the club, and proved most acceptable to all. The Regatta Day Committee, which outdid itself in the entertainment line, was composed of the following: Miss Ella Wright, chairman, Miss Annie Johnson, Miss Myra Angus, Miss Bella McCorrison and Mrs. Austin. The officers of the club are: Miss Rennie Catton, president; Miss Annie Johnson, vice president; Miss Ethel Spalding, secretary; Miss Charlotte Hall, treasurer.

The barkentine Irmgard entered the harbor shortly after 9 o'clock, moored at the Channel wharf. Hardy was she made fast when, with a general rush she was boarded by hundreds of spectators. Captain Christiansen entered into the spirit of the day and made no protest, with the result that through his courtesy hundreds of local people obtained a fine view of the races.

The yacht Hawaii was used as the judges boat and was very prettily decorated with signal flags. The Kamehameha with a party of eight seers aboard sailed up and down the harbor adding to the effectiveness of the spectacle.
