

TRAIL AND MOUNTAIN CLUB NAMES COMMITTEES

Advocates of Simple Strenuosity Secure the Hundredth Charter Member and Outline Some Plans.

An enthusiastic meeting of the Trail and Mountain directorate was held yesterday at noon at the University Club, the directors being the guests at lunch tendered by President William Castle. Eric Knudsen of Kauai was a guest of honor and the last of the hundred charter members of the organization to sign the constitution. This list is now full so far as the men are concerned, and the club is open for general membership.

A number of committees were appointed and the directorate, jealous of the Outrigger Club in its possession of a secretary who is a wonder, elected G. H. Tuttle as historian of the Trail and Mountain Club. Mr. Tuttle will set a pace if he equals his Outrigger record in the new organization. Reports were mentioned of splendid extension work going on in the other islands, notably Hawaii, from which island President Castle has just returned from a tour of observation and which Carl Smith is just about to encircle on a round of organization.

Hereafter members of mainland or foreign outing clubs will be received into the Trail and Mountain Club during their stay in Hawaii; an information committee composed of representatives in the club of almost every nationality being appointed to give trail information to visiting members of the Fujiyama Club of Japan the Touring Club of France, the Mountaineering Clubs of Germany, the Sierras of California or the Appalachians of New England. Members on the other islands were also added to give traveling Okinawans away from home information as to the lay of the land and trails in general. A trail committee was appointed with a preliminary fund at its disposal of two hundred and fifty dollars with which to prepare trail maps of the Islands and blaze the way for new trails to be cut. A publication committee was also appointed to take

charge of the literary department of the club. Books and maps will be issued from time to time giving needed information about the highways and byways of the Islands.

A committee of ladies was also appointed to complete the organization of the hundred charter members among the women. This committee will also cooperate with the other committees.
