



OUTRIGGER PLANS FOR A BIG SHOW

**McRae Stock Company to Move
to Waikiki on Evening of
Kamehameha Day.**

The afternoon and evening before Kamehameha Day, June 10th, is the time set for the big events at the Outrigger Club, at Waikiki. It is going to be a big success, about six hundred dollars have been contributed for tickets—and that before Managers McRae and Adams offered to close the opera-house on the evening of June 10th and send their people down to have a good time at the Outrigger grounds, and to help in the entertainment. The club expects to sell a couple of thousand tickets now.

Managers Hertsehe of the Moana and Lishman of the Seaside hotels expect that the Outrigger affair will be a record breaker, they have offered the club the use of their dancing halls for the big event, and the Hau Tree has offered its beach and lanai as a starting place for the night illuminated canoe parade, here the ladies will decorate the canoes. There will be busy times between now and June 10th among the Outriggerites, and a grand wind-up on that date.

The trustees of the property, J. P. Cooke and J. R. Galt, with the club secretary, G. H. Tuttle, and Curtis Hustace of the house committee, ran down to the grounds in autos yesterday afternoon and went over all the proposed improvements to be made in time for the big entertainment, and, incidentally, had tea from the brand new presentation tea set of the Women's Auxiliary.

Mr. Tuttle was instructed to have a map made of the property showing in different colors all alterations and improvements completed or proposed. Mr. Tuttle will act practically as director-general of the entertainment and supervise the improvements, such as the building of the big lagoon lanai, on the floor of which the dancers will have an opportunity to disport themselves. The Hawaiian Electric Light Company will lend hundreds of colored lights and wire, which Curtis Hustace will see are strung around the new and old lanais and under the hau trees, as well as along the beach between the two hotels. The long proposed coconut bridge will be built across the makai end of the lagoon. The roadway into the grounds from the street will be widened another five feet—and brightly lighted. Coconut trees have already begun to make their appearance on the beach, and the work will soon be under way with workmen swarming everywhere over the grounds. The big lanai will be doubled in size, forty by eighty feet of

lancing space, with a canoe lanai in front.

The ladies have promised to help and many of the plans for decoration and light effects will be left to their taste and skill. A parade of illuminated canoes from the Hau Tree to Waikiki and the lagoon is to be one of the features and there will be illuminated surfing, Kenneth Atkinson having invented at the last night surfing event, over a year ago, a bow light that fixed to a surfboard illuminates the rider with startling brilliancy.

Plans for the big event have been quietly in progress for some time. It will be possible to feed a thousand people, or more if necessary, at the chowder and feast, while as many couples will find room to dance at the two hotels and on the big lanai. A unique entertainment program is in progress of preparation and there may be a free show in the afternoon if the Clark cups are contested for—which is a probable event.

The finest and best canoes that can be procured will be offered to the members of the McRae Stock Company, and it is hoped that they will make up several crews for the afternoon races. It is safe to say that every member of the Outrigger Club will whoop it for McRae, and if he takes a steerman's paddle on the afternoon of the tenth, bets will be on McRae.
