ALL READY FOR BEACH STUNTS

ROYALS TO DO STAR
STUNTS ON LANAI STAGE

Canoë Races and Surfboard Stunts to Be Best Ever—Speaight Cup to Be Contested For—Big Crowd Expected.

Those who wish to dance early and often at the Outrigger carnival on the evening of July 4 will have the privilege of the dance hall at the Moana. There will be a string band there for the dancers, and the Royal Hawaiian Band under the trees for those who sit out the waltzes. The theatrical performance, with Baby Elliott and her parents as stars, will take place in the theater erected on the Outrigger grounds for the Royal company. After the performance, the big pavilion will be cleared, and there will be dancing on the big floor, which is now eighty by fifty-six feet.

Royal has been busy rehearsing his company in sections at the skating rink. He works with the cake-walkers all morning, the minstrels in the afternoon, and the vaudevillians between his turns at the Empire in the evening. Most of the night Royal spends writing words and music for the Honolulu local songs and jokes he is introducing in the big show. Baby Elliott has learned her Outrigger song and may be heard any time of the day practicing the chorus as she plays with her dolls on the Royal Hawaiian grounds.

The Outrigger grounds have greatly changed in appearance. The beach has washed back again so that a large crowd may congregate on the grounds to watch the regatta and surfing contest in the afternoon. The big lanai will be reserved for club members, and as this comes down to the beach, with its new addition, the entire Outrigger course may be seen from the pavilion. The chairs used for the theatrical performance at night will be at the disposal of the club members during the afternoon events. The tickets to the carnival and dance in the evening will also admit to the great reviewing stand during the afternoon.

The directorate of the Outrigger Club has taken hold in earnest and will see to it that the improvements begun, and already carried a long way, will be completed.

The house committee of the Outrigger Club will meet on the grounds at Waikiki tomorrow afternoon to complete final details for the Fourth of July regatta.

The Frank Speaight solid silver cup, for six-paddle racing, and the Clark trophies, for surfing contests, are now in the hands of the house

committee—G. H. Tuttle (chairman), Dave Center, Edward Dekum, Allan Herbert, Curtis Hustace—and all future events will be arranged by this committee.

Royal and Miss Elliott will reign during the evening. They have organized a large company and are turning the Outrigger lanai into a theater.

Here they will present at 8 p. m. a minstrel performance, with songs and jokes on dear old Honolulu.

This will be followed by a vaudeville show, cake-walk and dancing in the big pavilion.
