

# CARNIVAL COMMITTEES ON SPORTS BEGIN WORK

## A. L. Castle, Tennis; W. T. Rawlins, Swimming and Eddie Nell, Baseball Start Campaign To Make Events Best

Now that the holidays are past and everybody is ready to begin the new year right, the various committees of the Mid-Pacific Carnival are in the grind preparing their programs. This is particularly so with the committees on sport. Alfred L. Castle, of the tennis competition, yesterday announced that Beals C. Wright would arrive in Honolulu January 17, and that there would be a tournament at the Pacific Courts following the arrival of Wright. Ward Dawson and Clarence Griffin are expected to arrive within a few days of Wright. These two players are coming from Manila where they are now playing in the matches for the Philippine championships at singles and doubles.

### Boss Getting a Tryout

William T. Rawlins of the swimming events for February 22, has a scout trying out Norman Ross of the Olympic Club at San Francisco and upon his recommendations will depend whether Ross is to be a competitor in the meet. Lady Langer, the American long distance champion, and Miss Frances Cowells, the Pacific Coast champion woman swimmer are certain entries and both will arrive here February 14.

Miss Cowells will compete in the 50 yards, 100 yards and 220 yards events and already several of the local mermaids are preparing to go into training, all of which means that the visiting swimmer will have plenty of opponents in the various events.

What events Langer is to compete in have not as yet been picked. If Ross comes he will swim against Kahanamoku in the fifty and 100 yards which means that Duke will meet Langer only in the 220 and 440 yards. If Ross does not come, Duke will swim in the 220, 440, 500 and 880 yard races. William T. Rawlins will be able to announce his program as soon as he has word from San Francisco regarding Ross' ability to tackle Duke and the other local swimmers.

### In Baseball Circles

The announcement that Athletic Park and the Oahu League are to be under entirely new managements from now on created considerable gossip around sporting circles yesterday and the new turn of affairs brought expressions of general satisfaction wherever the subjects were discussed. Yesterday's mail from the Coast brought several interesting letters from Manager Otto Walfisch of the Olympic Club and arrangements have been completed at San Francisco for the Winged O aggregation to leave in the Great Northern January 26, which will bring them into Honolulu February 1. The opening game of the series in which the Olympics participate will take place Saturday afternoon February 5.

The appointment of Walfisch as manager of the Olympic Club during the trip to Honolulu has been announced by President William F. Humphreys of the club and the San Francisco Chronicle of December 23, carries a story to this effect. Walfisch writes that the team is practising daily and engaging in Saturday and Sunday ball games where opportunity affords. He further says that he is to have the best lineup possible and that he assures the fans of Honolulu a high grade of baseball. Besides the players and Manager Wal-

fisch, several other members of the club will make the trip to Honolulu, big Jim Kennedy, ex-president of the club and Frank Foran, secretary, both having signified their intentions of making the journey.

Complete arrangements have not as yet been made toward the housing of the Olympics here but they no doubt will put up at Heinie's Tavern. Manager Trotter of the popular beach resort is showing a lively interest in the coming of the Winged O boys and is willing to do his share toward making their trip a success. As the Outrigger Canoe Club is to allow the men the use of the club rooms, and the Hui Nalu are to show the boys the exciting art of how to ride a surfboard the beach will be the proper place for them to stop at. This will also afford them easy access to Moiliili Field as well as Alexander Field for practise should they not care to make the long trip to town.

All details regarding the trip of the Olympics will be settled this week at a meeting of the new management of the park, the baseball committee of the Carnival and the Oahu League officials.

### Who's Who In Olympics

As manager of the Olympics will be Otto Walfisch. He is one of the oldest members of the Olympic Club and has held the amateur title as heavyweight and middleweight boxer and heavyweight and middleweight wrestler of the Pacific Coast. Walfisch also gained fame with the "O" track and field team and was noted as the closest rival of the great Ralph Rose in the weight putting contests. He is also a clever story teller and singer and has promised to take part in a show being arranged for "Peaches" Martin, who is going to the big brush next year. Roy Bliss, rated the best semi-professional in California. "Dutch" Schammel, a spitball artist and southpaw Howedge will be the boxmen. Bart Burke, first string catcher of the "Winged O" for many years, and "Tad" Reardon, a comer behind the bat will be the catcher. "Jackie" McGrath, one of the very few left-handed first basemen in the game will guard the initial sack. Eddie Been, called the Johnny Evers of the bushes owing to his size and snappy work around the keystone sack will play second base. "Flash" Kennedy and Don Rippon are playing at short. Rippon is yet undecided whether he can make the trip but is making great efforts to get away. Trimatola, third baseman and captain of the crack Santa Clara College team will take care of the difficult corner. Muhl, Ebner, Swanton and Barker are the outfielders.

Eddie Bruns, remembered by Honoluluans when he was here a few years ago and last year as catcher of the National League champions, is endeavoring to make the trip with his wife and if he can get away promises to catch for one of the local teams against the Olympics.

In the meanwhile the local magates are lining up their aggregations for their games against the Walfisch aggregation. Eddie Nell has not had a chance to lineup his Punahou as yet but will get them into action with the coming of clear weather. Manuel J. Paresa of the new Honolulu is angling for several of the All-Army team while J. Arcia is building up a fast combination to represent the St. Louis College team.

The All-Chinese will be somewhat remodeled in that the team will be strengthened by the addition of Ayau, Lai Tin, and Kuanlee. The Twenty-fifth will also figure in the series and there is a possibility of the First Infantry also meeting the Olympics.

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
