

# A. A. UNION IS DEFINITELY FORMED

G. S. Tuttle, First President, Is  
Backed Up by an Able  
Management.

The Hawaiian branch of the A. A. U. was definitely formed yesterday afternoon, when delegates from the various clubs met in Lorrin Andrews' office and appointed their officers. Delegates from eight clubs were present, and in some cases the extra men allowed were also present. Lorrin Andrews was in the chair, and Paul Super was elected as the secretary and treasurer for the meeting.

The first matter to engage attention was the election of the board of managers. This body is picked out from among the delegates from the various clubs and calls for a body of not more than fifteen. On the motion of A. H. Ford, it was decided that the present body consist of eight men, one from each of the clubs represented, and that as new clubs came along, then fresh men would be taken into the board until the requisite number is reached. This was seconded by A. H. Tarleton, who also put in the proviso that no one man could receive two nominations from two separate clubs and serve on the board of management.

## The Representatives.

Only one delegate from each club had the privilege of voting, and the men represented to make the selection for their various clubs are as follows: Myrtle Club, John E. Soper; Healani, A. E. Tarleton; Outrigger, Lorrin Andrews; Trail and Mountain, G. S. Tuttle; Punahou, F. O. Boyer; Palama Settlement, W. S. Bowen; Y. M. C. A., Paul Super; Grammar School, C. T. Fitts.

When these gentlemen came to make their selection for president, Lorrin Andrews' name was, of course, in everybody's mouth, but that gentleman told them that although he appreciated the courtesy, he would not be able to accept the position on account of the rush of work he had on hand. This being the case, Tarleton, after thanking Andrews for what he had done for them in the way of assistance, proposed G. S. Tuttle as the first president of the local association. This was unanimously agreed to.

## Committee Lists.

Mr. Tuttle will make out his lists of the committees and hand them in at the next meeting, which is to take place on Saturday next at one o'clock in Mr. Andrews' office. The lists will then be gone over by the board of managers and finally passed. Some of the committees call for members of the board of managers only, but others call for delegates from the various bodies affiliated, so that the list will be quite a long one.

While the meeting was quite a suc-

cess, regret was expressed that several bodies who had announced their intention of joining in with the movement, and had promised to be there, failed to put in an appearance. Among those who so signified were the Mailes, the football and cricket clubs, the Kamehameha Schools, McKinley School and the St. Louis.

Besides the filling of the presidential chair, that of the vice-president is to be taken over by A. H. Tarleton, and the double duties of secretary and treasurer by W. S. Bowen.
