

KAMEHAMEHA TO RACE OUTRIGGER

The Outrigger Club held an important meeting yesterday afternoon in the rooms of the Public Service Association, at which there was a full attendance.

The special object of the meeting was to discuss the lowering of the dues from \$10 to \$6 a year, payable in advance.

Another question which was brought up was whether or not to incorporate. It was decided not to bring the question up for discussion again until the new officers are elected in January.

A representative of the Kamehameha Aquatic Club was present and after the principal business was transacted the matter of having some canoe races on the Fourth of July was discussed. The Kamehameha delegate wanted to know if there was any possibility of having canoe races for the championship of the Hawaiian Islands between the two clubs.

He was informed that the Outrigger Club was a member of the A. A. U. and so could not compete against the aquatic club. The representative asked if there would be any races if the K. A. C. joined the A. A. U., and Captain Melanphy announced that there would be two canoes in the race on July 4.

Dr. A. C. Wall will let the Outrigger crews use his racing canoes, and of this the boys are very appreciative. Kenneth Brown will captain a second crew.

H. Gregson is now pleased that he may see his Hawaiian crew which swept the board at the recent regatta held at Kalihī harbor again contesting for paddling honors. After these races the crew issued an open challenge for a six-paddle canoe race for a trophy and the championship of the Hawaiian Islands, to be contested on the harbor or at Waikiki on the Fourth of July.

This challenge will be taken up by at least two crews—the Outrigger crew and Kenneth Brown's crew—and it is likely that the Kalihī crew will compete.

During the meeting the house committee was censured for lack of interest in the club, and the members were notified either to get down and attend to their duties or make place for those who have the interest of the club at heart.

The lone member of the committee present, A. G. Smith, promised for the other committeemen that they would devote more time to their duties hereafter.

There are some applications for membership in the club to be considered, and these names will be acted upon later.
