Free Sports for the Fourth.

Ed. Towse is enthusiastic over the sports to be pulled off at Kapiolani Park on the Fourth, to which the men of the British cruisers are to be cordially invited. The sports will be free, and sane, fireworks being left entirely out of the program. Starting off with a series of bicycle races for the newsboys, which are being arranged by Charles S. Crane of the Advertiser, there will be motorcycle races and a few horse races. Bill Chilton is looking after the cycle races, which is guarantee enough that there will be nothing lacking as far as this end of the program is concerned. Then A. Junglaus will get a few crocks together to provide the features for the turfites, and he has several horses in view which he opines will race some. A tug-of-war is also being mentioned, and other events calculated to keep the expected crowd entertained. The idea is an excellent one and merits the support of all citizens. The sailors will no doubt appreciate the courtesy which is extended to them by the invitation to partake of the sports and will be on the park in force.

Boxing Bouts Tomorrow.

Three boxing bouts will be pulled off at the Orpheum Theater tomorrow evening, in which sailors from the Kent and the Challenger will play a prominent part. The main event is for the possession of a gold cup held by Bob Wade of the Challenger, which Stoker Biggans of the Kent is striving for. Biggans is a fighter who has made the name of the Kent famous in China and Australian waters, having held the championship of the China station as late as last year. Wade was also at one time champion of the China station; he also holds the championship of the Australian station, and was champion of the Mediterranean station some years ago. The men fight at 146 and 148 pounds respectively, and as they fight under Marquis of Queensberry rules, clean break, fans can anticipate some long range fighting. Bloomfield of the Challenger, 130 pounds, and Young Gans of Honolulu will probably provide one of the preliminaries, while an opponent will be found for "Sky" Kerrison, 150 pounds, also of the Challenger. Mike Paton will referee the bouts and will no doubt see that the men adhere to the rules under which they fight.

Outrigger Boys Awakening.

The Outrigger Club reduced the annual dues to \$6 per year and dropped the idea of incorporating, at the meeting of members held yesterday. The house committee came in for a shaking up at the hands of the members, who wanted to know what was the matter with the members of the committee. Portuguese Team for the Keio Series.

Brito and Franco, the Japanese catcher and second baseman, respectively, have joined the Portuguese team for the series with Keio, both being qualified by nationality to play, but both being barred under the Oahu League rules from playing. However, they are to play. The Portuguese have a strong line-up, and are to pitch H. Bushnell in this series, though Bushnell is not permitted to pitch in the league. However, it is hoped by the Portuguese that Bushnell will be allowed to twirl for the Portuguese in the second series, and most of the fans would be pleased if this permission were granted. Soares will be back in the game for the Keio series and will take his accustomed place behind the batter. Bushnell or Freitas will pitch; Brito will be on first, Franco on second, Bushnell or Freitas at shortstop, Souza on third, Ornellas a right field, Madeiro at center and Ponte at left field. With this line-up the Portuguese should give a good account of themselves.

Relay Races for Britishers.

As there are several speedy men on board the British cruiser Kent, a suggestion has been put forth that a relay race between the fastest four Britishers and the four best men on shore be arranged. Harold Godfrey took the matter up and arranged a team composed of Bill Rice, the island champion; himself, Bill Desha, G. Manoha and Sing Hung. If the race is arranged it will probably take place on Monday afternoon, each man to run a furlong. This should prove a great event, for the visitors will have to be speedy to lower the colors of the Honolulu sprinters.

The Hawaiian Rowing Association held a meeting last night in the Healan boat house, at which the following were elected to the committee for the annual regatta:—R. Rietow, Myrtle Club; Robert Thompson, Healan Club; and George Turner, Puunene Club of Maul. A suggestion that annual shell races be held at Pearl harbor between the two Honolulu clubs was made and it will probably go through in due course. It is too late for this fourth but next year a start will be made again with these events.
