Out at the Athletic Park there will be a couple of ball games, in the first of which the Native Sons will meet the Japanese, and in the second St. Louis will cross bats with the Kelo team. At the time of writing there is some doubt as to whether the Kelo players will be here in time to play ball, but Tony Marcallino received a wireless from Manager Muroa this morning in which the latter stated that the boys expected to be off port at one o'clock, if not sooner, and asked for a launch to meet the Persia at the quarantine grounds and bring the players ashore. An effort will be made to have the customs officials and the health authorities pass the Kelo boys as soon as practicable and get them here in time for the second game. All being well, the ball games will take place as scheduled.

## Relay Race at Kapiolani.

## General Invitation for Ball.

Arrangements for the ball at night have been completed. No invitations will be sent out, but a general invitation is extended to everybody to attend. The ball is not confined to any class; everybody is welcome. From 7:30 until 9:30 Berger's band will give a concert at the Young Hotel, and at nine o'clock the official reception will take place. In the receiving line will be Governor Frear and Mrs. Frear, E. A. Mott-Smith and Mrs. Mott-Smith, Admiral and Mrs. Cowles, General and Mrs. Macomb, Ralph G. E. Forster, British consul, and the captains of the Kent and the Challenger. In the event of the captain of the Challenger being unable to attend, the executive officer of that ship will take his place in the line.

The ball will be held in the two ball rooms of the Young Hotel, which will be connected by electric bells, in order to keep the dances together, so that number six will not be being danced in one room and number seven in the other.

The music for the dances will be provided by Nainoa's band, which will strike up immediately after the reception is over, and dancing will be continued until the last of the couples is satisfied. The committees as published in Saturday's Star will be in charge of the floors, with the single exception that Colonel Jones, who has his hands full with decoration and other matters, drops out.
