## MEET TO BE HELD

BISHOP'S SLIP WILL BE SCENE  
OF SOME GOOD  
SPORT.

At a meeting of the Hawaiian Association of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States of America, it was decided to hold an Aquatic meet in Honolulu on "Admission Day," August 12, 1911.

The affair will be for the purpose of establishing swimming and aquatic records for the Hawaiian Islands. It will be the first official meet, in Honolulu, of the A. A. U., and much interest is attached to the affair.

The aquatic sports will be held at Bishop's slip and, later on, the time for starting the events will be announced. There are nine clubs in the local branch of the A. A. U., and they are as follows: Healani Boat Club, Myrtle Boat Club, Outrigger Club, Hawaiian Association Football Club, Trail and Mountain Club, Puunene Athletic Club, Y. M. C. A., Palama Athletic Club and the Grammar School League.

Besides the members of these clubs, individual athletes can, after joining the A. A. U., compete in the aquatic sports. John Soper will accept entries, and the fee for joining the A. A. U. is nominal.

The program of events that are to be raced off, is attractive, and the list is as follows: Fifty yards swimming race, one hundred yards swimming race, two-hundred yards swimming race, four-hundred yards swimming race, eight-hundred yards swimming race, one mile swimming race, three hundred yards relay swimming race, six men, each to swim fifty yards; plunge for distance, and a diving contest; the last event will not count in club points.

Prizes will be given to first, second and third men, in each event, and a prize for the club scoring the most points. The club points will be: Winner, 5 points; second, 3 points; third, 1 point.

There is no doubt that the aquatic meet will be a success and, at it the first records made by amateurs in these Islands will be established. There are some fine swimmers in Honolulu, and it is thought that the figures that the men will put up will be a credit to Hawaii.
