

REGATTA DAY PLANS INDICATE EVERY BREEZY DAY'S SPORT

With polo out of the way water sports will come into their own and the road cleared for the annual celebration of Regatta Day, perhaps the most popular sporting festival of the year.

The program has just been announced and it is of an attractive nature.

There are five events for the rowers: senior barge, junior barge, freshman barge, senior pair oar and junior pair oar.

In these events the Myrtle, Healani and Puunene rowing clubs will take part.

The ever-popular whale-boat race figures on the program as of yore and the same old strenuous contests between the crews of the inter-island steamers may be expected.

In the canoeing division there are races for six-paddle canoes, four-paddle canoes (modern), three-paddle canoes (women), and a race for sailing canoes.

The six-paddle canoe event is for the Hawaiian championship and if the Kona crew is again entered a contest worth seeing is assured.

It is understood that the Hui Nalus are desirous of entering crews in the six and four-paddle canoe races, but, owing to their affiliation with the A. A. U. they will be unable to do so unless the prizes offered are of other than a cash nature.

The Outrigger Club may enter crews in the canoe races unless they have decided to limit their athletic exercises to moonlight hops on their delightful, water-bordered, wave-lapped lanai.

A race for pilot boats appears on the program and should be productive of a sterling tussle for premier honors

as there is a good deal of rivalry between the crews of the boats in this division.

The mosquito fleet have not been neglected, races having been provided for both wrens and pearls.

The Keenans' four-oared barge for the Puunene Rowing Club arrived by the S. S. Lurline this morning in good shape. It will not be shipped to Maui but will be kept here pending the arrival of the Puunene crew who will come to town for their final training in a couple of weeks. The Maui rowers are said to be doing good work on the water of Kahului Bay and their form in the harbor will be watched with much interest.

The Myrtles will receive their new six-oared Keehan barge by the S. S. Mongolia, due here next Monday, Tom King having received a cablegram to that effect.

Both the Myrtle and Healani crews have settled down into their training stride and it will be nothing but hard work for them from now until the great day.
