REGATTA DANCE WAS A SUCCESS

Whaleboat Race—Four Oared.

1. Tom Mahuka's Number Two crew.
 2. Tom Mahuka's Number One crew.
- Won easily by two minutes' margin; time 19:26.

Senior Six-Oared Barge.

1. Myrtle Boat Club.
 2. Healan' Boat Club.
- Won by thirteen lengths. Time 13:45. The better crew won on their merits, although it was a great race. The turn was made by the Myrtles in seven minutes forty seconds, and the Healanis a second later. The start was a good one, but the Myrtles caught the water first. The two crews hit up a forty to the minute clip, but steepped down to thirty-four when passing the judges' boat for the first time. After the turn was made, the Myrtles forged ahead. The Healan' boat seemed to ride too high, and the wind caught the barge and retarded her pace. The Myrtle boat sat lower in the water and glided along easily.

The finish was all in favor of the Myrtles and, although the Healanis sported in desperate fashion, the Reds were too good and won easily.

- The Hai Nalu bunch took the lead at the start and held it tight through the race. There was a great struggle for second place and the Kama just managed to pip the Outrigger boys on the post. The course was covered in seven minutes thirty seconds, and the difference between the first and second was thirty-seven and two-fifth seconds, at the finish.

- The start was a good one and, right away, it was apparent that the Healan' crew was a beauty. The form they exhibited was well worthy of a senior crew, and at the turn they led by eleven seconds. The Myrtles rolled a bit, but the Healanis were a well balanced bunch, and made every post a winning one. At the finish the Healanis were thirteen lengths ahead of the Myrtles, and they did the course in eleven minutes flat.

- This was a great race and, from start to finish, it was hard to say which crew would win. When within ten lengths of the winning line, the Healanis sported in wonderful fashion, and managed to land winners by a little over a length. The time was one minute fifty-four seconds, and it must be considered very good, considering the stiff breeze that was blowing right on to the backs of the oarsmen.

There was a great race up to the finish, but the Healanis won out by a margin of two seconds, with the Punneuse about three lengths behind, in third place.
