

AQUATIC MEET NOW DRAWING ATTENTION OF SPORT LOVERS

The aquatic meet of the Hawaiian branch of the A. A. U., which is to be held in Honolulu harbor, Kamehameha Day, June 11, is already beginning to attract considerable attention, not only among those who will enter as participants in the various races but as well among those who follow water sports as lookers-on.

The Hui Nalu which won the meet in August of last year, mostly through the good work of Duke Kahanamoku and Vincent Genoves, is certainly out to capture this year's championship. Of course, Duke is out of it here, but very much to the fore in the East just now preparing for the Olympic races to be held soon at Stockholm. Genoves, however, is here and the Hui Nalu bunch count a good deal on him.

But there are others figuring on wins, too. The Healanis club has the biggest entry list so far, and in the bunch they have young Cunha, who is said to be a fast swimmer. The Healanis figure on Cunha beating Duke's record in the 100 yard dash. That would be going some but it is possible.

While the Myrtles and Outriggers will be in the meet they are still short on entries. Still there is a little more time and these two clubs may fatten the list a little more before the entries close finally this afternoon.

Punahou and Kamehameha have served notice of intention to enter teams but as yet no entries have been made. There is good material among these boys.

Quite a number of entries are expected from unattached individuals for the boys' races. These people should remember to take out their membership cards in time so as to be able to qualify.

Entries close at five o'clock today with Mr. J. F. Soper at the Hawaiian News Co.

The events, and the order in which they will take place, follow:

- 1, 440-yard swim;
- 2, 25-yard swim for boys under 15 years;
- 3, Fancy diving;
- 4, 50-yard swim;
- 5, 880-yard swim;
- 6, 100-yard swim;
- 7, plunge for distance;
- 8, 50-yard swim for boys under 15 years;
- 9, 220-yard swim;
- 10, one mile swim;
- 11, club relay swim.

If enough athletes do not answer roll call to make more than one heat in an event, such heat shall be considered the final.

There is a penalty for entering an event and not competing in that event on the day the meet takes place, so it is wise not to enter in more than just the events one intends to participate in.

All men competing in any A. A. U. meet must be registered.
