

# LARGEST HAWAIIAN CANOE IN THE ISLANDS FOR MIDWINTER CARNIVAL

A famous Hawaiian war canoe will be brought to Honolulu from Hawaii to be used in the historical pageant during Mid-Pacific Carnival week, February, to represent the arrival of Kamehameha the Great on Oahu more than a century ago.

Prince Kalaniana'ole promised his eighteen-paddle canoe to Senator Chillingworth for use in the pageant. Senator Chillingworth, director of the 1913 Floral Parade, who appeared before the promotion committee and outlined a portion of his plans, stated that the landing of Kamehameha would be one of the most gorgeous of all features in the historical pageant. It would show the great conqueror with his fleet of canoes rounding Diamond Head and approaching the shore near the Outrigger Club. Grass houses upon the shore and a large number of natives armed with spears, would form the beach setting. Palenapa, who is probably one of the best proportioned Samoan-Hawaiians in the Islands, has been chosen to represent Kamehameha. The canoe is said to be the largest in island waters.

The big canoe will be brought here in a few weeks from Kailua and placed under the care of the Hui Nalu Club to whom it will be presented by the prince after the Mid-Winter Carnival is over.

## Historical Pageant Entries.

Senator Chillingworth said the parade would include many other historical features and all of the Islands would be represented. J. H. Coney of Kauai, has already taken the matter up with influential residents of the Garden Island, and they will design and finance the float to represent a legend which will have a bearing on Kauai. Hawaii through, Sheriff Pua and other Hawaiians, will take up the float question for the big island, while Maui is certain to be represented.

Several villages on this island have

become interested and from Laie comes the promise to enter a float in which the sister of Pele, goddess of volcanoes, figures. Mr. Chillingworth will make a tour of the island tomorrow visiting Waikane, Kaneohe and many other places and form committees.

The decorated automobile section and Island Princess section will be kept up to its standard. Senator Chillingworth has already done considerable planning and is preparing a list of those who he believes will be able assistants. The matter of secretary to the director-general is yet to be decided, although Mr. Chillingworth has already expressed a preference for J. Walter Doyle. The selection of a secretary is entirely in the hands of the director-general.

The promotion committee yesterday received a poster design from Germany, the work of Klinger, regarded as Germany's foremost poster artist. The work is exceptionally good, showing a Hawaiian of splendid physical proportions riding a surfboard, in blue poster water. The poster appealed to the committee very strongly and was accepted as a design, and may be used for the 1913 advertising campaign, while the Coonley design may be held for the 1914 carnival.
