Promotion Committee Hopes To Have Her Back In September

It is hoped to have the big steamer back on the route by October, and possibly by September.

The committee confirmed the appoint ment of Emil Berndt as chairman of the committee and of Ed Toyse as vice chairman. All of the other members of the committee were present: A. P. Taylor was reappointed secretary of the committee for the coming year.

Waldron, local agent for the steamship company is planning to go to the mainhand soon, in hope of being able to induce the company to recommence the trips of the steamer as early as September, and certainly earlier than November, the date now set.
