

Trio of Natators Will Arrive on Wilhelmina

Vollmer, Langer and Cann Du: Here Tomorrow Morning—Mayor Lane and Band Will Welcome the Visitors to Honolulu—All Three Champions Have Defeated Duke Kahana-moku—Many Feature Events Listed for Swim Carnival

On Tuesday morning the trio of champion swimmers who will compete in the big swimming carnival on the evenings of September 1, 2 and 4 will arrive in Honolulu. They are coming on the Wilhelmina accompanied by W. T. Rawlins. With their appearance here swimming will take an added boost and all things will be pointed toward the big meeting on the harbor.

A reception committee will go out on a launch tomorrow morning, and Mayor John C. Lane will present the boys with a key to the city. Herbert Vollmer, indoor champion in the 220-yard; Ludy Langer, American champion in the 883-yard swim, and Ted Cann, national champion in the 500-yard event, will be greeted.

Brand on the Job.
The committee has secured the Hawaiian band to welcome the boys at the dock, and upon their arrival they will be given a ride around the city and then escorted to the Seaside, where they will make their home during their stay here.

Ludy Langer has been here before. Cann and Vollmer are making their first visit to the Paradise of the Pacific. All three swimmers are real champions in every sense of the word and people will not soon forget the showing made by Langer during the carnival when he won the 220 and 880 and finished second to Duke in the 440 event.

Have Beaten Duke.
All three swimmers have victories over Duke in various events, and this fact will bring out interest in the coming carnival, as the trio will naturally be anxious to show the citizens of Honolulu that the mainland can produce swimmers of a high standard. Vollmer has been the swimming sensation of the East, and the enthusiasts on the mainland are saying many good things of Cann. Langer has established himself as the leading long-distance swimmer in America today.

Banquet at Y.
On Tuesday evening the visiting swimmers will be the guests of the Y. M. C. A. at a big banquet which will unite the swimmers of Honolulu and the mainland. A number of prominent citizens of Honolulu will be present, and a number of excellent talks on athletics are expected.

The banquet will be the first of a series of entertainments that have been planned for the visiting natators, and a trip around the island, a dance at the Outrigger and luau have been suggested as a means to give the noted athletes a good time. The committee composed of Charles Stillman, Jack Phillips, Glenn Jackson and Dude Miller will look after the stunts for the visitors.

Swimming Talks.
A number of the leading citizens of Honolulu are expected to be called upon to tell what they know about the swimming game, and the guests are expected to hear something more of the biggest event in the aquatic world. They'll all be out, ready to join in giving the swimmers a reception. On the nights of the meeting the boys will be minus a number of friends

who wish them well, and the spirit of kindness will be displayed before the swimmers get into action.

Plans for the swimming meet are well under way in regard to seating, and the sale of tickets at the Hawaiian News Company has far surpassed the expectations of the most optimistic. Everybody and his brother will be there, and without doubt the sister end of the affair will not be neglected.

Many Features.
The committee on events has arranged an ideal program, giving the swimmers an opportunity to compete in more than one event each evening. On Friday night the feature events will be the 503-yard Hawaiian championship, the 563-yard Hawaiian championship and the 50-yard race for girls.

On Saturday evening there will be four big features with the 100, 220 and 440-yard championships and the girls' race for 100 yards. On Monday evening the big event of the carnival will be staged. This is the 100-yard national championship, which was awarded to Hawaii this year for the first time in history. In addition there will be staged the 880-yard Hawaiian championship which will bring out the strength of Ludy Langer, present American record holder.

Girls' Events.
In the girls' events Bernicia Lane, Helen Rosa, Casey Lane and Gerd Hiroth will be entered. The latter is the novice who created such a sensation at the Y. M. C. A. meet by swimming the 50 yards in 35 in her first competitive race. Bernicia Lane, the island champion, will make an effort to retain her honors, but Helen Rosa has been improving of late, and many believe that she will take the honors away from the title holder in the short event.

If Gerd Hiroth can make 25 seconds with very little competition and take turns too, she should improve this in an open meet, and although it is a great deal to ask, many believe that she will finish in the first three in her second race. The 50-yard event should bring out a close race among the girls, and Bernicia Lane appears to be a favorite for the century.

Watch the Kids.
Not every open event will attract more attention than the novice races, if the past performances of the youngsters can be taken as a criterion. Altrix Konawaloff, Sabota, Pua Kealoha and other youngsters should make a great showing in the events and when the time for the kids in the 223 is called up, look for something around 2:30 at least. When the time comes these kids will be ready to take the place of the older boys.

With the entrance of the service swimmers into the meet, and Fort De Russy natators ready to challenge the other service organizations, the spectators may look for a meeting that will not be all Duke-Vollmer, etc. Variety is the spice of life to the committee and there will be any amount of spice dashed out to the lovers of aquatic sports.

ST. LOUIS DOWNS LULUS IN LOOSE GAME ON SUNDAY

Draymen Defeat Ruger Squad in Opening Tilt at Park; Errors Present

Errors triumphed over runs and broke even with hits in the game between the Lulus and Saints Sunday at Athletic park. St. Louis triumphed over the Lulus by a score of 9 to 2. Janssen was on the mound for the Saints and held the Lulus safe throughout. Crumpler did the hurting for the Lulus.

Crumpler showed a heap of stuff, but had the fault of many twirlers aiming to make good, that of working too hard. The 91st Company heaver tried to fan 'em air out, and he did send 11 back to the cooler, but weakened in the last two innings.

Nye caught for the Saints, and played the position in good shape, and in addition secured two hits off Crumpler. Crumpler was the leading hitter for the Lulus, landing a double and a single. The game was marred by poor work on the part of the Lulu infield, seven errors being chalked up against the quartet.

The curtain-raiser proved to be the better game, and in this tilt the Service First got the bulge on the Ruger team and won out by a score of 2 to 1. Kan Yen was the star for the Draymen, both on the offense and defense.

Ku, for the Service, and South, for the Rugerites, were the opposing pitchers, and both heavers allowed but four hits. J. Perry was the swatting hero for the truckers, landing three singles. The Service First team made but two errors while the Rugerites are credited with an errorless game.
