Kruger Is Going After Backstroke Record; Predicted It Will Be Smashed

This is the race for which the mainland swimmers were brought to the Islands and like all things which are the best has been saved for the last night. There is little chance that the existing record of 0.53 1-5 will be lowered although another surprise may be sprung and some dark horse push Duke to the finish The century champion for a new mark. is the favorite in this event and there is little chance that any one can beat Kahanamoku to the 100 yard mark. After the results of Saturday evening's hundred Cunha looks good for second honors with Kelii erowding him. The two New Yorkers have shown sprinting ability and may upset the dope again by placing. Vollmer has a world of speed and Cann proved in the 220 Saturday that he can sprint and the easterners must be considered in the century championship. This is not Langer's dis-tance and it is doubtful if he will be seen in the event.

Langer's 880

In the 880 yard Hawaiian Championship, Langer the national champ is the easy favorite. If Duke does not enter this event the big fight for second honors will be between Cann and Kelii. Both the New Yorker and the island "comer" have plenty of endurance. Kelii has rounded in to championship shape so fast lately that most anything can be expected of him. He is a triffe slow on the turns, but when he masters this, the aquatic speeders are going to be few and far between that can make this husky youngster eat their splash. Kruger For Record

The 150 yard back-stroke will undoubtedly be changed to 100 yards. "Stubby" Kruger is going after the record and it is rumored that he will break it. The world's record for the century for swimming ou the back in open water was made at St. Louis in 1904 by Walter Brack of Germany in 1:16 4-5, "Stubby" has been caught in practise several times in 1:12 and 1.13 and it looks very much as though the blonde haired boy is going to smash this record by several seconds. He is in excellent condition and his trainers state he will finish tonight trainers state he will finish holder of a new rerord.

Healani Fast

In the 600 yard Club Relay (six men. 100 yards each) the Healani sextette are doped to win. They have six men swimming the century under one minute and with such a combination as this it will be hard for any club to defeat them. The team swimming for the Healanis will be composed of six of the follow-ing: George Cunha, "Stubby" Kruger,

The speedy Ah Kin Yee looks like the best bet in the fifty yard novice race. He can negotiate the hundred under a minute and should tear home the winner in the half-century. However Kenneth Auld and Matsuguma are fast sprinters and will contest the whole distance.

Pingry should have little trouble taking the 220 yard Service race.

In the high diving, Robert Fuller, the Hawaiian champion, has little competition and will score many points ahead of his closest competitor.
