Big Two-Day Card Already Arranged With Twenty-four Splendid Events

With the exception of receiving the entries for the twenty-four different events, virtually every preliminary arrangement necessary has been made for the big two-day Carnival swimming meet, which will be held in the government slip at the foot of Alakea Street on Thursday afternoon, February 22, and Saturday, February 24.

That it is possible to hold a two-day meet during this Carnival is due to the number of mainland swimmers of national repute and record who have been induced to come here, or are already in the Islands. The credit for getting mainland swimmers to compete is generally given to W. T. Rawlins, a Honolulu lover of the sport who has made the personal acquaintance of most of the noted swimmers of the United States.

Rawlins has managed and directed the swimming meets in Honolulu for the last decade, and on a number of occasions has accompanied Island swimmers on junkets to the mainland where they were entered in national contests. Through these trips with Hawaiian swimmers, Rawlins, or "Billy," as he is known to half the Island residents, formed friendships which made it possible for him to induce the mainland swimmers to come to Hawaii for the 1917 Carnival meet.

One of the best known of these mainland swimmers who are to compete here is Perry McGilivray, national champion for the 100-yards. He will leave Chicago today for San Francisco, where he will board the *Wilhelmina* and sail for the Islands on February 7. On the same steamer will come Miss Dorothy Burns and Mrs. Aileen Allen of Los Angeles. Miss Burns holds the woman's Pacific Coast record for the 100-yards, and is reputed to be the third fastest woman swimmer for this distance in the United States. Mrs. Allen is the woman's national champion diver.

Norman Ross, the big, husky California distance swimmer, arrived in Honolulu on the last *Matsonia* and can be seen swimming almost every afternoon at Waikiki. Lady Langer, another California distance swimmer, has been here since last September and will compete with Ross and Hawaiian swimmers in the Carnival meet.

Officials for the various Honolulu swimming meets in recent years have nearly always been the same, when practical. These officials are almost, if possible, as ardent followers of the water sport as Rawlins. According to an announcement made by Rawlins, the same officials who acted at the swimming meet in September will officiate at the Carnival meet. The following is a list of the officials selected: Judges—Lee Foulard, Charles K. Stillman and G. D. Center; timers—Ben F. Hollinger, Robert Horner and Lester Petrie; starter—George Crozier; C. E. ("Ginger") Mayne; clerk of the course—Lorrin Andrews; scorer—Alice May; announcer—Glen E. Jackson; marshals—A. T. Longley, Jack Phillips and E. K. Miller.
