

WOMEN SWIMMERS MUCH APPLAUDED

Mermaids From Mainland Too Much For Local Girls In the Speed Events

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 event was 2:47. The remainder of the swimmers were, Dennis A. O'Brien, James A. Baehausen Jr., Carbis A. Walker and Howard M. Goetz.

The 440-yard race was exciting throughout and provided a sensational finish, Norman Ross closing strongly and compelling Rudy Langer to extend himself to win by a scant length. The extent to which the "Big Moose" pressed the Los Angeles swimmer is reflected in the time made by "Ludy," 5:17 3-5, the previous world's record of 5:19 having stood to the credit of Kiernan, the Australian since 1905. McGillivray was third and Keli finished a bad fourth.

The first 100-yards was clocked in 1:06 1-5, the time being Langer's.

The 100-yard race for juniors resolved itself into a match between Ah Kim Yee and John Kealoha Jr., the former just getting home after a most exciting race, in :60 4-5, not bad time at all for juniors.

A Surprise Winner

Francis Brown of the Hui Nalu created a small sensation by winning the 220-yard race for novices, very cleverly. It was Brown's first race and the crowd appeared to think that he was in the race just for fun. He surprised them, however, for he swam in beautiful form and won handily, after being in the lead all the way. His time was 2:36 1-5. George Moikoikahi finished second, starting slowly and forging from fourth place to second in the last 120 yards. Albert V. Kaehu was third. Anson Derezgo fourth and Albert Butzke brought up the rear.

Wonderful Diving

Mrs. Aileen Allen delighted the spectators with some wonderful diving, her work from the 20-foot platform being especially good.

The 220-yard race for ladies was another swimover for Dorothy Burns, and she won by at least thirty yards from Josephine Hopkins and Rose Somers, the time, 3:03, establishing a new American record for the distance. The winner swam the first 100 yards in 1:15.

In the 150-yard back-stroke race Harold Kruger swam the first 100 yards in 1:13 2-5, breaking the world's record held by him for this distance, of 1:14 3-5. He kept on and won the race in 1:57 1-5, breaking his own Hawaiian record for the distance of 2:01 4-5. Clarence Lane was second, Norman Ross third, and "Buster" Carter fourth.

High Diving Winners

The high diving resulted in first and second honors going to Robert K. Fuller and Jack Hjorth of the Heanani Y. & B. C., respectively, William A. Cottrell of the Hui Nalu being placed third.

The 75-yard six-man relay race was won in the last jump by the Heanani Y. & B. C. John Keli just squeezing home ahead of "Audy" Holstein of the Hui Nalu. The time was 4:13 3-5, the old Hawaiian record being 4:18 1/2. Keli started the last length of the course considerably in arrears, but he put every effort into his strokes and brought home the bacon for the all-blue. A Palama Settlement S. C. team was third.

HISTORIC COACH ON EXHIBITION FOR TIME

The Wells Fargo Stage Coach has been placed on exhibition for the youngsters of Honolulu under the big arch of the Pan-Pacific building. Here it will remain for a few days until it is returned to the senders. The entire expense of shipping this overland stage coach, one of the last in existence, was borne by the Wells Fargo Express Company at the request of the Pan-Pacific club. It has been viewed by thousands and tens of thousands in the Indian raid on the Palace grounds and in the Pan-Pacific pageant, but now it may be more closely inspected by native sons of the golden West, whose fathers crossed the continent, perhaps in this very vehicle, and by the boys of Honolulu who know of the old overland stage coach days and the great holdups, (and this stage has been held up,) only by tradition—and reading.

Comes Back To See City After More Than Thirty Years

After an absence of thirty-two years George Romney, accompanied by Mrs. Romney, is again visiting Honolulu. It was away back in 1885 that Romney first visited this city. On returning he says he was surprised when he saw the many fine buildings, good hotels and stores Honolulu now possesses.

Romney's home is in Salt Lake, Utah. He is a prominent Mormon, is president of the Hotel Utah, one of the best hostels in the Western States, vice-president of Zion's Cooperative Mercantile Company, the Mormon community organization that last year, Romney stated, did a business of over seven million dollars, and vice-president of the Home Fire Insurance Company.

Thirty-two years ago Romney visited the Volcano with a party of friends. In getting there from Hilo he said they traveled by railroad, coach and horseback. When asked the comparison of the Volcano now with what it was then, he said:

"There is no comparison. Thirty-two years ago when I viewed it for the first time it was very low. Today it is a much grander sight. It is one of the big things worth coming over here to see. It and the Pali offer two of the most wonderful sights to be seen in all the world."

Mr. and Mrs. Romney will sail on the Great Northern tomorrow for San Francisco. They will visit in California for a few months and then return home to Salt Lake City.
