

OUTRIGGER CLUB ORGANIZES SWIMMING AND DIVING TEAM

The following resolutions were adopted at a meeting of members of the Outrigger Canoe Club, interested in organizing a swimming and diving class last Saturday.

Whereas the purposes for which the Outrigger Canoe Club was organized and is now maintained include the encouragement of water sports, and especially surf-riding in canoes and on boards, and swimming and diving; and

“Whereas we desire, and hereby pledge ourselves, to assist and take active part in the promotion and encouragement of said water sports; and

“Whereas we believe that the Outrigger Canoe Club should employ a competent instructor to take active charge of this branch of the club's activities;

“Now therefore, be it resolved, that the board of directors of the club be and it is hereby requested to engage the services of an instructor and trainer for the benefit of members of the club wishing to enter aquatic competitions as representatives of the Outrigger Canoe Club, and to take such steps as may be necessary to organize and establish instruction classes in swimming and diving for such members.”

On motion by Maurice Melanphy, G. D. Center was unanimously chosen as captain of the proposed swimming and

diving team, and the meeting unanimously approved of Clair Tait as instructor and trainer, and urged Captain Center to endeavor to secure his appointment to the position of instructor.

A resolution introduced by Lorrin Andrews Jr., provided that a committee of three members of the club be appointed by the captain of the swimming and diving team to prepare and submit an outline of a plan for the establishment and operation of the swimming and diving class, and that the board of directors be requested to provide emblems which may be worn by the members of the swimming and diving class who become especially proficient.

Ronald Higgins moved—“That the Outrigger Canoe Club be authorized to approach the board of directors on the matter of obtaining Prince Cupid's racing canoe, and also to try and work up a crew to man the boat and enter it in the races at the next regatta.” The motion was seconded by Lorrin Andrews Jr., and was unanimously carried.

Twenty-eight members of the club have signed an agreement to enter the swimming and diving class and to compete for the club in future aquatic meets.
