

# "Y" Will Hold Indoor Swims August 8 and 10

## Events For Two-day Tank Meet Decided Upon At Meeting Called By Jackson

A two-day swimming meet will be held in the Y. M. C. A. tank Wednesday, August 8, and Friday, August 10. This was decided at a meeting, called by Glenn E. Jackson, physical director of the Y. M. C. A., and held at the "Y" last evening. It will be under A. A. U. sanction and the A. A. U. will be requested to sanction the meets as the Hawaiian indoor championship. It will be the first tank championship meet to be held here.

The following events were arranged:

### Wednesday, August 8

Service relay, four men swimming 40 yards each.  
100-yard service.  
50-yard girls, open.  
50-yard boys.  
220-yard boys.  
High diving.  
50-yard novice.  
150-yard backstroke.  
50-yard swim.  
220-yard swim.

### Friday, August 10

Club relay, six men swimming 60 yards each.  
50-yard service.  
220-yard service.  
100-yard ladies open.  
50-yard ladies, novice.  
Spring-board diving.  
100-yard novice.  
Breast-stroke, 200.  
100-yard swim.  
500-yard swim.

### Judge Dole May Swim

The order of events was not decided upon, but the grouping by days as given above was approved. Two other races may be added. Mr. Jackson said that Judge Dole had challenged any man more than forty years old, and a race for the judge will be put on if a competitor can be found. An inter-collegiate relay also will be staged if possible.

The classifications for girls and boys are not the same. By "boys" is meant a youngster less than fifteen years old. No age limit has been fixed for the women. Their races are classified as "novice" and "open", and a novice, for both men and women, is one who has not won a place in the A. A. U. meet. No age limit was fixed for women because most of the novices are the younger girls, anyway, and it was not desired to bar any girl less than fifteen, who would be able to hold her own with the older women, from the open races. Miss Hjorth, for example, is one girl who can give a good account of herself with almost any woman swimmer here.

A committee was appointed, consisting of Ludy Langer, Lawrence Cunha, Ben Clark and Dad Center, to have general charge. It will meet at seven-thirty o'clock tomorrow evening at the Y. M. C. A.

### Three Leading Swimmers Attend

Three of the leading Island swimmers were present last night—Langer, Stubby Kruger and John Kelii. Duke Kahanamoku and Clarence Lane, who were requested to attend, were not present, and no one knew whether Kahanamoku would enter the meet. Langer said he would try to get in shape for the meet.

Entries will close August 1, one week before the first day's swims. Entry blanks will be prepared as soon as possible.

Mr. Jackson presided at the meeting. Others who were present were: Harold Castle and Harry Decker of the Y. M. C. A. swimming committee, O'Brien of the Alert, Captain Pepin of Fort De Russy, Langer, Miss Ruth Stacke of Palama, Kelii, Kruger, Thies of Palama, Rogers, Center and Clair Tait of the Outrigger.

### Wishes of All Ascertained

The program was drawn up by the full meeting, the opinions of the swimmers, representatives of the clubs and of the service being asked in each case, and it was believed that the wishes of each group had been met so far as possible. Instead of having a meet of one evening only, which would be too short to give time for all the desired events, it was decided to have a two-evening meet, which, on the other hand

## Fifty-yard Women's National Championship Apparently Awarded To Hawaii

News of interest to swimming circles of Honolulu is contained in letters received by Lorrin Andrews, secretary of the A. A. U., from F. W. Rubien, secretary-treasurer of the national organization.

### Miss Galligan Will Come

It is apparent from Mr. Rubien's letters that the women's national championship 50-yard swim has been awarded to Honolulu, although no formal notice to that effect has been received from him. A letter stated that Miss Clare Galligan had telephoned him that she would go to Honolulu. This indicates that the 50-yard is to be swum here. Better indications were contained in another letter, which said that the 500-yard women's national swim was to be held at San Francisco, but that the date has not been set definitely because San Francisco wished to know what Honolulu's dates were. A tentative date of September 16 had been set, Mr. Rubien wrote, but he asked the local A. A. U. to get in communication with San Francisco. If the 50-yard or another swim for women were not to be held here San Francisco would have no reason for wishing to know Honolulu's dates. Mr. Andrews reasons from this that the 50-yard has been awarded Honolulu, as expected. There is no news concerning the longer swims for women. They probably will go elsewhere.

Miss Olga Dorfner probably will not be brought here. She wrote that she would be unable to come unless the association would pay the expenses of a chaperone, seeing that she would need some one to care for her on the steamer (Miss Dorfner is not a good sailor) and the A. A. U. scarcely can see its way clear to bear that additional expense. The A. A. U. plans to have Misses Frances Cowells and Dorothy Burns, besides Miss Galligan, come for the women's swim.

### 100-Yard September 2 or 3

News despatches received here that the 100-yard men's national championship had been awarded to Honolulu for September 23 were in error, as a letter from Mr. Rubien showed. The swim has been awarded for September 2 or 3, the omission of the word "or" having caused the mistake. Mr. Andrews' intention had been to ask for September 1 or 3, September 1 being the Saturday before Labor Day and September 3 being Labor Day, but apparently there was confusion somewhere. September 1 was included only because it was well to have an option of two days, Labor Day, of course, being the first choice.

The 440-yard national championship swim for men will be held at Neptune Beach, Alameda, San Francisco Bay, at three-thirty o'clock in the afternoon of August 11. Mr. Andrews said that he hoped some of the Honolulu clubs would send representatives. Entry blanks may be obtained of Mr. Andrews. Entries will close August 4, so that prompt action will be necessary. If Honoluluans are sent to San Francisco the Olympic Club might be more inclined to send Norman Ross here—not particularly for the 100-yard, for Ross is no sprint swimmer, but for the distances, in which he is well-nigh supreme.

### Eastern Swimmers In Service

Mr. Rubien further advised Mr. Andrews that Vollmer, Cann and most of the Eastern swimmers had volunteered for the war and that nothing was to be expected of them. The A. A. U. had intended to bring them here. As it is the mainland prospects are limited to

The meet in a sense will be a preliminary to the A. A. U. swims September 3. The August dates were selected so as to give a breathing space between the two meets. The Y. M. C. A. by arranging for the swims, has filled the gap in the usual summer's program left by the inability of the A. A. U. to hold the outdoor Island championship.
