

# INDOOR CHAMPION SWIMMING RACES RECEIVE APPROVAL

A.A.U. Sanctions Y. M. C. A. Meet August 8 and 10 As Championship

The swimming meet in the Y. M. C. A. tank the evenings of August 8 and 10 will be the first annual Hawaiian indoor championship meet. The A. A. U., at a meeting yesterday afternoon, decided to add this to the sanction already given. Persons winning this year's races will be Island indoor champions until the next meet. It is altogether probable that the indoor swims will become fixtures, as the outdoor swims have been.

At a meeting last evening the games committee appointed at the afternoon's meeting drafted this program for the two-day meet:

The plunge for distance was added last night. Otherwise, the races are the same as those already announced.

Entry blanks may be obtained Monday and thereafter at the Y. M. C. A. of Glenn E. Jackson, physical director, or at the Hawaiian News Company of John F. Soper, chairman of the registration committee of the A. A. U. Entries may be made at either place. They will close August 1, one week prior to the first day's meet. There will be no entrance fees. To defray the cost of medals and cups admission will be charged—fifty cents for reserved seats and twenty-five cents for the windows, roofs and upper lanais. The Y. M. C. A. will assume whatever other expense there is.

### Mrs. Leo Is Chaperon

The following committee will be in charge: Mr. Jackson, chairman; Dad Center, Lully Langer, Lawrence Cunha, Lloyd Conkling, Kaniaw Evans and Mrs. L. Fullard Leo. Mrs. Leo will be official chaperon of the meet and will be in charge of the women's dressing rooms, which will be in the Y. M. C. A., across the street from the Y. M. C. A. Mrs. Leo will represent the women's auxiliary of the A. A. U.

Arrangements will be made to hold a preliminary meet Tuesday night, August 7, to reduce the number of entrants in each race to four, should this be necessary, so that no preliminaries will have to be run off August 8 or 10. There are five lanes in the "Y" tank, but not more than four men can swim well at one time. Not more than four relay teams can be admitted, but not more than four are expected for either of those races.

### Intercollegiate Relay Possible

Besides the service and club relays there are good prospects for an intercollegiate relay, but no definite arrangements have been made. Judge S. B. Dole, who challenged any man more than forty years old is not in Honolulu and a race for him probably will not be held.

Cups will be given to the winning relay teams. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be given to the first, second and third individuals in the open races, and silver and bronze medals to the first and second individuals in the limited races. For the club relay the Outrigger, Palama, Healani and perhaps the Hui Nalu are expected to enter; and Fort De Russy the Alert and Fort Kamehameha for the service relay.

Kelii, Kruger and Langer will swim. Dad Center said that Duke Kahanamoku was interested and would like to enter. Duke will go to Hawaii soon, but probably will return prior to the meet. No one has interviewed Clarence Lane, but it is presumed that he will enter, thus completing the list of the Island stars.

The Chicago Americans won the second game from Boston yesterday, 5 to 2, dividing the series to date at one game each. Chicago now has a lead over Boston of three games, with which it started the series. Boston won Thursday, 3 to 2.

St. Louis beat Washington again, 5 to 2, and went to sixth place, Washington dropping to seventh. The race for last between Washington, St. Louis and Philadelphia is as frantic as a Balkan war used to be.

New York defeated Detroit, 3 to 1, and took back fourth place, which it lost when Detroit took the first game Thursday. Philadelphia won the first game from Cleveland, 6 to 2. These teams did not play Thursday.

### Cincinnati in Third Place

There is a real feature in the National. Cincinnati won the first from Brooklyn at Brooklyn yesterday, 4 to 2, while St. Louis was losing to Philadelphia, 3 to 4, and the Reds took third place, having a three-point lead over the Cards and being thirty-six points behind the Phillies. The Cincinnati fans probably are unable to credit the news. When it is considered that the Reds have gone up the ladder in this manner while on the road it must be admitted that they are one of the strongest teams of the league and, although not pennant-contenders this year, are going to be dangerously near that in 1918. And they have accomplished this climb without possessing more than one star pitcher. Toney is that, but he is the only one.

### Giants Beat the Pirates

New York won the first of the series from the weak Pirates, 4 to 0. The defeat of Chicago at the hands of Boston, 5 to 0, finally sent the Cubs below .500. Brooklyn is only seven points behind and could take fifth place by winning as the Cubs were losing.
