

INDOOR SWIMMING MEET WILL CLOSE WITH BIG EVENTS

Four Championship Races Will Be Run Off At Y. M. C. A. This Evening

The program for the second half of the Hawaiian indoor swimming championship meet, to be held tonight in the Y. M. C. A. pool, promises to be even better than Wednesday's. Three men's championship races, competitive spring board diving, two women's races, two service races, one novice race and the club relay make up the program. The races will begin at eight o'clock.

No Collegiate Relay

No intercollegiate relay race will be held this evening. Yale and Harvard alumni were to race; then the Harvard team was changed to that of the Hawaii Polo & Racing Club, which will be unable to get together a team. There will be ten events instead of eleven.

The entries are much the same as for Wednesday, with a few additions, but the events themselves will offer more competition. At the conclusion of the swimming Governor L. E. Pinkham will present the medals and cups won by the various clubs and individuals and service teams.

Two Feature Races for Men

The three events on the program looked forward to with the greatest interest probably are the men's 100-yard and 500-yard championships and the women's 100-yard championship. The men's 100-yard race is the second on the program. Contesting in this will be Clarence Lane, John Kelli, Stubby Kruger, Lorrin Thurston and perhaps Kahanamoku. Lane held a satisfactory lead over Kelli in the 50-yard championship Wednesday night and Thurston pushed Kelli to the limit, coming in a close third. Either swimmer, however, could easily crowd Lane in the century and Kruger is almost sure to displace one of the three. Kahanamoku may swim and may not.

The 500-yard race, after the way Ludy Langer took the 220 Wednesday, almost would be conceded to him except for Kruger's entry.

There should be a good scrap between Kealoha and Rowatt, in this event with a good chance of them giving the leaders some competition. Kruger will have competed in the 100-yard race which may give his opponents a slight advantage. Duke may make things interesting if he swims in this race.

Three In Women's Race

The women's 100-yard championship has three entries. Miss Kathleen Law, Miss Gerd Hiorth and Miss Josephine Hopkins, entered as unattached, Palama and Outrigger, respectively, will make a keen race. Although Miss Law did not quite come up to expectations in the 50-yard, her strong trudgeon stroke should stand her in good stead in the longer distance and she is backed by many to overcome the Honolulu entrants.

The exhibition diving should be as good as anything ever seen here. Practically all of both the older and the younger divers are represented. Arrangements are being made for a special lighting system to enable everyone to observe the diving more easily.

Service Men Will Compete

The 50-yard and 220-yard service relays are strong attractions on tonight's program. The relay and races Wednesday night by the men from the Alert, Fort De Russy and the Engineers drew a large part of the audience and the same will be true tonight. Competing in the 50-yard event will be R. Murphy, Dennis O'Brien and F. B. Dodge for the Alert and Arthur W. Pingry for De Russy. In the 220-yard service will be R. Murphy for the Alert, Pingry, C. A. Walker and W. H. Hensley for De Russy and J. A. Buchanan for the Engineers. Buchanan is expected to withdraw on account of a shoulder injured in rifle practise. This will reduce the race to four entries and make competition even keener.

Fifty-Yard Race Given To Honolulu

Women's National Championship Will Be Swum Here. Probably September 4

Formal notice that the 50-yard women's national championship swimming race had been awarded to Honolulu finally has been received. In response to a cablegram sent Tuesday, Lorrin Andrews, secretary of the Hawaiian A. A. U., received a cablegram yesterday from F. W. Rubien, secretary-treasurer of the national A. A. U., which said that the "50" would be held here. It had been accepted as certain that Honolulu had been awarded the race, but no formal confirmation had been received. Miss Claire Galligan, for one, will come. Misses Frances Cowells and Dorothy Burns are expected.

September 1 Out of Question

The plans for holding the race September 1, the Saturday preceding Labor Day, will have to be abandoned. The Hawaii Polo and Racing Club will have polo September 1. If the women's race were held that evening the bleachers would have to be moved from Kapiolani Park to the harbor, returned in time for Monday's polo and again moved for Monday evening's swimming races, chief of which will be the men's 100-yard national championship. No date for the women's race has been set, but it probably will be held Tuesday, September 4, which would give one feature race each day of a two-day meet.

The return of President W. T. Rawlins is awaited eagerly. Mr. Rawlins doubtless will have much to report of which Honolulu now remains in ignorance.

Ross Will Sail Tuesday

Norman Ross is expected to sail from San Francisco Tuesday, arriving in the Wilhelmina August 21. His races with Ludy Langer will bring together two of the greatest long-distance swimmers of the world. Ludy's contemplated retirement after the September races and his residence here will lead Honolulu to pull for a victory for him.

The San Francisco Chronicle of August 2 had this to say of Ross:

Norman Ross, holder of many world's records, will sail for Honolulu on August 14, immediately after the national A.A.U. 440-yard championship at Neptune Beach, to participate in the Hawaiian championships taking place on September 2 and 3. He intends entering all the races from 100 yards up to the half-mile, including the breast stroke and back stroke races, and will swim against Duke Kahanamoku in the national 100-yard straightaway, at which distance the latter holds the world's record of 53 1-5 seconds.

Ross hailed from Portland in 1915, having just recovered from smallpox, to participate in the exposition races held at Sutor Baths and not having gained back sufficient strength, he did not show to good advantage against the Duke. Now that he is swimming faster and is in better condition than at any time in his career, he is looked upon in the islands as the closest competitor for the Hawaiian over the century.

The 220, 440 and 880 yard races will feature Ross again against the Duke, Langer, Lane, Kruger and Kelli, members of the Hui Nalu and Healani clubs in Honolulu, and world's records are looked for in these events.

Ross expects to return to the Pacific Coast immediately after the races.
