

# Excellent Program Arranged For Meet at Y. M. C. A. Tonight

Ludy Langer Will Appear in 500 Yard Event—Clarence Lane Favored to Win Out in Century—Close Race Expected in Girls' 100 Yard Swim—Diving Exhibitions Featured—Race for Girls Under 15 Years Old Promises to Bring New Talent

The final events in the big swimming carnival at the Y. M. C. A. will be staged this evening. A record crowd was on hand in the first evening, and there is certain to be another large crowd in attendance tonight, when the first event begins at 8 o'clock.

Tank swimming is increasing in popularity, and with such a large number of entries the present meet, which is the first A. A. U. championships, has proved a big success. A number of close races are expected in the events this evening.

#### Langer in 500

The 500-yard swim will perhaps be one of the feature events of the evening, and this should bring out some good talent, although Ludy Langer is expected to finish ahead of the field. The women's events, and the service races are also popular features.

Sheridan Winsor should win out in the 50-yard novice event over Hitchcock of the Outrigger, although this race is expected to be a real finish. Harvey is also good over this distance. Hitchcock sprang a surprise the other evening and may crowd Winsor to the limit.

#### Lane in Century

Clarence Lane is picked to win the century swim from the other contenders, and ought to make pretty fast time, as he looked especially good in the 50-yard event on Wednesday. John Kelli ought to finish second in this event with Harold Kruger third. Lorrin Thurston has improved greatly and will no doubt give the three stars a great race.

In the 50-yard swim for girls under 15 years of age, Edith Kenn, the 12-year-old mermaid, is figured to win out by a narrow margin from her sister, Thelma Kenn. The younger sister has showed to advantage in tank swimming, and although she lost out to Thelma in open water, should win in the 50-yard tank race. Another close race is expected between Elsie Auld and Eleanor Lyser for third place.

Pua Kealoha looks like the winner in the breast stroke with William Rowatt making a strong race for second. Richard Carter has also made good time in this race, and should finish close up with the leaders.

#### Gerd Hiorth Favored

There is certain to be much interest in the 100 yards women's championship, and in this race the longer distance will give some of the mermaids an advantage. Gerd Hiorth should win out in this race with everything equal, providing that she judges her pace. Kathleen Law is better at the longer distances, and it appears as if her best race would be the 220 or 440. Josephine Hopkins has made good time in the century and ought to finish ahead of the Los Angeles girl. The young ladies will have an opportunity to show what can be done in sprint swimming here. It would not be at all surprising to see the time for the winner around 1.18.

In the 500-yard championship Ludy Langer appears to have the call with Harold Kruger and John Kealoha trailing the champion. Langer showed enough in the 220-yard event to insure his making good time over this distance.

#### Thurston Improves

The springboard diving should bring out some good exhibitions, and with Robert Fuller entered, the events should be good. Fuller looks like a winner in this event, although Lorrin Thurston has been making some good exhibitions of late, and should beat out Jack Hiorth.

Healani should win out in the relay race which will close the program. A close race is expected between Palama and the unattached team for second place. Palama may have the edge with Clarence Lane as an anchor man.

#### Service Events

In the 220-yard service event Pingry should come back and defeat Murphy, although the Alert man won out in the 100-yard event. Walker of De Russy is better over the furlong distance and should win a third place.

Murphy looks the best in the 50-yard event, although Dodge is expected to crowd him to the limit. Pingry will without doubt make a strong race over this distance. This ought to be a great race throughout, as O'Brien has plenty of speed in the shorter sprints.
