Ready For Twenty-first Regatta Celebration

Thousands To Enjoy Big Day's Program, With Colors of Rival Boat Clubs Struggling For Rowing Honors In Placid Waters of Honolulu Harbor

Tomorrow will tell the tale; today the respective tubbing clubs are putting on the finishing touches to their crews. By one o'clock tomorrow it will be known who are the point winners of the Blue of the Honolulu, the Red of the Myrtle or the Gold of the Hilo—of the twenty-day celebration of Regatta Day in Honolulu.

The Honolulu Regatta Club and others will flock to the waterfront tomorrow morning to view the races to be under the auspices of the Hawaiian Rowing Association, represented by the Honolulu Regatta Day Committee, consisting of H. B. Kroll, George Crozier and William Lyle. The Myrtle, Kaula and Aheanli tubbing clubs will be assigned points from which to view the races, and to hand out upon hundreds ribbons, badges have been issued, the wearers to be guests of the different clubs.

The races will begin promptly at nine thirty in the morning and the boats should be well over the water 'o'clock in the afternoon, even if there are fifteen entries in the program of the day.

In addition to the Regatta Day Committee, the officials of the day will be Judges—C. E. Mayo, Charles K. Hill and John T. Mair; starter, C. Hill; and timekeepers, Ben Hallinger, Lester Peters, T. K. King, W. A. Cottrell, clerk of the course, W. Young; assistant clerk, T. O'Brien; recorder, L. C. Thompson.

For the information of the general public, the following official notice is hereby given:

Official Notice

"Race open to all, no entry fees. Each entry shall include the name of the boat. There must be at least three boats start before a second prize will be awarded. All racing races to be governed by the racing rules of the Hawaiian Rowing Association.

"First race starts at 9:30 a. m. sharp. At starting gun and finish of race boats to show by means of flags displaced from masthead of judges' boats. The order of flags from top down represent the boat that shows showing club colors as follows: Blue, H. Y. & H. Club; Red, W. B. Club; Gold, Hilo Yacht Club."

The program of the day, giving the class, starting times, courses, prizes and other information, is as follows:

SIX-PADDLE CANOE RACE—Limited to Hawaiian crews. Prize: Individual gold medals. Course: From line at Myrtle Boathouse to Kaula Club, at judge's boat.

ENTIRE PAIR SLIDING SEAT—Prize: Individual gold medals. Course: From line opposite Myrtle Boat Club to Kaula Club, at judge's boat.

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ENTIRE—Kaula, Hilo, Kuluana or Unnamed, Myrtle.

Winners of this event for past five years: 1912, Alameda; 1913-14-15, 16, Heanali.

FRESHMEN SIX-OARED SLIDING SEAT RACE—Prize: Individual gold medals. Course: Kaula Boat and Kaula Club.

ING-SEAT RACE—Prize: Individual bronze medals. Course: From a line at judge's boat to and around flag opposite spar buoy, keeping the same on the port side in turning, then back to starting line, boats to keep their own water throughout the race.

ENTIRE—Kuluana or Iwalian 21, Heanali, Jas. L. Torbert or unnamed, Myrtle.

Winners of this event for past five years: 1912, Myrtle; 1913-14-15-16, Heanali.

FOUR-OARED STEAMER BOATS—Prize: Trophy—First \$250.00; second, \$150.00. Course: Spar buoy to Kaula line at judge's boat. Entered by Honolulu's Boating Dry Dock—H. H. S. S. Mauna Loa, S. S. Mauna Kea, S. K. Kanae, S. S. Heleia, S. S. Lulekiki.

INTERMEDIATE SIX-OARED SLIDING SEAT RACE—Prize: Individual silver medals. Course: Same as Freshman large.

ENTIRE—Kuluana or Iwalian 21, Heanali, Jas. L. Torbert or unnamed, Myrtle.

Winners of last year's race: Myrtle Boat Club.

SURF BOARD PADDLE RACE—Prize: First, gold medal; second, silver medal; third, bronze medal. Length of boat must not be over six feet. Course: Same as senior piloted.

ENTIRE—Ostrigger canoe club and Hilo Yacht Club.

JUNIOR SIX-OARED SLIDING SEAT RACE—Prize: Individual silver medals. Course: Same as Freshman large race.

ENTIRE—Kuluana or Iwalian 21, Heanali, Jas. L. Torbert or unnamed, Myrtle.

Winners of this event for past five years: 1912-13-14, Heanali; 1915-16, Myrtle.

JUNIOR SCULL SLIDING SEAT—Prize: Individual silver medals. Course: Same as Senior Pair Unnamed, Myrtle.

Winners of this event for the past five years—1912-13, Heanali; 1914-15-16, Myrtle.

BOYS' SIX-OARED SLIDING SEAT RACE—Limited to boys under 15 years. Course: Same as Freshman large.

ENTIRE—Kuluana or Iwalian 21, Heanali, Jas. L. Torbert or unnamed, Myrtle.

Winners of last year's event—Heanali.

NAVAL CUTTER RACE—Prize: Same as Senior Scull.

ENTIRE—U. S. Alert, Engine Room Force; U. S. S. Alert, Deck Force.

Regatta Rules

Judges—The jurisdiction of the judges shall extend over the regatta and all matters connected with it, from the time it is specified to start until its final termination. Their decisions in all matters shall be final and without appeal. Any competitor refusing to abide by the decision, or to follow the directions of the judges, shall be disqualified. The judges, if they think proper, may reserve their decision, provided that every case such decision shall be given on the day of the race.

Starting—The clerk shall inspect the hull of all races and all men's, boys, and surf, pertaining to the same, before the course clear, shall report to each club the time of the starting of the race, and the time of the starting of each race in the event of a change of position of any buoy, marks and so forth, of the course.

Assistant Clerk—The assistant clerk shall act as a judge of the turn in all races and shall otherwise act as assistant at the clerk of the course.

Starter—The starter shall start each event subject to the control of the judges. In the event of a tie taking place in any race the same crew shall contend again on the same day after such interval as may be set by the judges. Any crew refusing shall be adjudged to have lost the race. All regattas shall be held for points, and the club securing the larger number of points shall be the winner of said regatta. First place shall count five points, second place, three points, and third place one point. In the event of a tie in points where a trophy is offered, the Regatta Committee shall provide a trophy for each club tied.

Starting—All boat races shall be started in the following manner: The starter, on seeing a signal from each boat starting, and on being satisfied that the competitors are ready, shall give the signal to start by gunshot. If the starter considers the start fair, he shall recall the boats to their positions by a gunshot, and any boat refusing to start against shall be disqualified. Any boat not at its post within ten minutes of the time specified shall be liable to be disqualified by the judge. Boats shall be started by their bows, and shall have completed their course when the bows reach the finish. All boats shall be started from a boat start.

Boat Start—Each boat shall keep its own water throughout the race. A boat's own water is its straight course, parallel with those of the competing boats from the position assigned to it at the start of the race. The boat's own water and proper course during the race.

Rules On Fouls

No fouling whatever shall be allowed. If a boat committing a foul shall be disqualified. It shall be considered a foul when, after the race has commenced, any competitor, by his own boat, or person coming in contact with the boat, boat or person of another competitor. The judges may, during a race, suspend the regatta in the event of committing a foul. The judges, when appealed to, shall decide all questions relating to a foul. A claim of a foul must be made to the judge by the competitor, and he must get out of the boat. In case of a foul the judges shall suspend the regatta until the offender is recalled by all the boats engaged in the race, other than the boat committing the foul. Said race to be started over again on the same or another day.

Accidents—In the event of an accident, except when during a race, interference with by any outside boat, the judges may order the race to be started over again on the same or another day.
