

Gold, Red and Blue Colors To Vie As Contenders For Regatta Honors Today

Crews All Ready For Mighty Struggle, and For Victory Or Defeat In Honolulu's Twenty-first Annual Rowing Races — Thousands Expected To View Events In Day's Big Program

They're off!

At nine-thirty this morning Honolulu's waterfront will be a busy beehive, for the Hilos, Myrtles and Healanis, sequence followed advisedly, will struggle for Regatta honors, though not first on the program, yet the real big event of the day, in the great six-oar barge race.

Colors will rule supreme this morning, the Gold of Hilo, Red of the Myrtles, and Blue of the Healanis. Which will emerge triumphant the day will tell. Hilo, representing the Big Island, will engage in but this one big race, for the Crescent City sent up to Honolulu its one champion crew, the stalwart bunch that wrested victory from the Capital City last Fourth of July in the quiet waters of Kulo Bay.

Otherwise the strife will be solely between the Myrtles and the Healanis for the other major events of the day. Aquatic sport fans will miss the Honolulu from today's Regatta. Inability to secure proper rowing gear accounts for the withdrawal of what was once a promising rowing contender.

Dai Nippon On Trial

The Healanis have been uniformly successful during the past five Regattas, although the Myrtles have been no mean contenders by any means, wresting a victory now and then. Yet, this year the Reds are out with that color in their eyes and, as between the Red and Blue the struggle will be a mighty one today.

Dai Nippon, although not represented today in the personnel of any of the rowing crews, will be on trial, for both the Myrtles and Healanis will use for the first time six-oared barges built by Harada, a faithful subject of the Mikado. In the tryouts the past few weeks both boats have given satisfaction; it remains for today to tell whether the Harada creations will triumph over the makes of famous mainland builders.

All the way through, beyond the senior six-oar race, the Myrtles seem to have the edge, although the Healanis will not admit this. Today will tell the story. Great interest attaches to the intermediate race, in which the Myrtles have two entries, the "Panini" and "Beef Trust", as they have been popularly nicknamed, and the Healanis also have their own prickly pear aggregation.

Watch the Girls, Please!

The Freshman, Junior and Boys' races will also be of big interest. The Myrtles have in their under eighteen years' a crew that should be an eye-opener, and they are placing great hopes on their performance.

A race that should excite great interest, especially among the feminine following of the rowing game, will be that between the Blue and Red crews of the Kunalas Girls' Club. Both have been faithful to duty and have been out daily and at work with a vim, energy and pep truly remarkable for the species.

Rivalry, if nothing else, is keen between the Blues and Reds. Whoever six wins the losers will be sure to have given a good account of themselves.

Bill Rosa, Myrtle coach, remarked yesterday that the Blues would make the Reds blue. This was reported to the stroke of the Blues.

"Bully for Bill," she exclaimed. "It's the best ever."

"And you," said the stroke of the Reds, "when we get through with the Blues bunch they will be some red, too; how, there!"

Navy Number Interesting

On Pier 2 there will be bleacher accommodations for about three hundred patrons and guests of the Regatta Committee. The Hawaiian Band will be in attendance and will assist in cheering the spirits of both losers and winners.

The cutter race between crews of the U. S. S. Alert; the canoes and surfboard races and other event, principally the pair-oar and scull numbers, will be interesting. The rowing meet should be well over by one o'clock in the afternoon. In the evening the rowers and their friends will be entertained at a dance at the Outrigger Canoe Club, Waikiki. During the afternoon the men who won and lost will be guests at a luncheon to be held at Antonio Kaoo's place, Sheridan Street. A number of the Hilo crew expect to get away for the Big Island in the Mauna Kea this afternoon, provided they do not attend Kaoo's luncheon. If they do it will be Honolulu for them until next Wednesday at the earliest.
