

OUTRIGGER REGATTA PROGRAM CHANGED

Five-Week Aquatic Meet At Waikiki Slightly Altered As To Dates

Several changes were made by the regatta committee of the Outrigger Canoe Club and Woman's Auxiliary last night in the program previously published in The Advertiser, for the November Regatta at Waikiki.

The events scheduled originally for Sunday, November 4 and 11, will be held on Saturday, November 3 and 10, with the sole exception that the sailing race set in the program for Sunday, November 4, will remain as originally scheduled.

The program fixed before for Sunday, November 18, suffered no change in date, but that originally set for Sunday, November 25, has been advanced to Saturday, November 24. The program fixed originally for Saturday, December 1, was not changed in date.

The following officials have been chosen for the five-week regatta:

A cup has been offered for a race between Duke P. Kahanamoku, "Lady" Langer, "Stubby" Kruger and John Keli, which will be swum from Castle's Point to the Outrigger pier.

If these men will enter this race the Outrigger Canoe Club will secure the sanction of the Hawaiian Society of the A. A. U. for the event. A good number of members are anxious to see these four fast swimmers in action over this course and have put up the cup for the race.

Drastic Rule Made

Members desiring to enter any of the events of the coming regatta, which will be held November 3, 4, 10, 18, 25 and December 1, will find a list and entrance book at the club commissary for the purpose. Entries opened on October 15 and will close on October 31. In all surfboard events the limited lengths are as follows: Seniors, nine feet; juniors, eight feet.

Any member of the Outrigger Canoe Club or Woman's Auxiliary, who has competed against these organizations in swimming or other Hawaiian sports, will not be eligible to enter in that branch of sport.

A chowder and dance will close the regatta events the evening of December 1, which will be a Saturday.

Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded to the entrants finishing in first, second and third place, respectively, in each event on the program.

The program of events for the first day of the great regatta, Saturday, November 3, is as follows:

First Day's Program

50-yard ladies' swim.

25-yard swim for boys under twelve years.

50-yard men's novice swim.

100-yard swim for girls under fifteen years.

Swim for elderly members, from Castle's Point to Outrigger diving stand.

Swim for junior and senior members, same course as above.

On Sunday, November 4, a sailing race will be held over a triangular course off the surf at Waikiki.

Try-outs Last Sunday

Hundreds of members of the Outrigger Canoe Club and Woman's Auxiliary and other spectators last Sunday afternoon watched a number of impromptu races held at Waikiki. D. M. Simple and A. H. Tarleton finished in a dead heat in a race from Castle's Point to the Outrigger diving stand. One or the other may have been a length and a half ahead, but the finish was so close that the paper decision called it a draw.

Duke Kahanamoku, C. Walker, H. Harvey, Gay Harris and "Kid" Cooke also went over the course, with Duke leading the bunch without much apparent effort. Josephine Hopkins also went over the course, and when the real race comes off it is likely that four or five other girl swimmers will keep her company.

The cup for the winners will be displayed during this week at Culman's, while the medals may be seen at Wickman's.
