

KRUGER WINS LONG RACE AT WAIKIKI

"Stubby" Shows Heels To Walker and Kahanamoku In Big Castle Swim

"Stubby" Kruger won the classic event on Saturday afternoon from Carbis A. Walker and Duke P. Kahanamoku in the mile and a half swim from Castle's Point to the Outrigger Canoe Club's diving stand.

This was the feature race of the afternoon among quite an interesting number of aquatic events pulled off by the Outrigger Canoe Club on the final day of its whole month's first regatta. Duke Kahanamoku was greatly handicapped in this event, owing to the fact that he had pulled a paddle in a hard canoe race shortly before the classic was called and swum.

However, all honors go to the plucky "Stubby" Kruger, who delights in long-distance swimming and is easily the better man in the distance races over Duke, the latter, as everybody knows, being at home mostly in the sprints. At that Kahanamoku is no mean adversary in the distance races.

Walker, former service swimmer, swam a plucky race, but Kruger, who used his head in addition to his arms and feet, finished easily fifty yards ahead of Walker.

Miss Hopkins a Star

Miss Josephine Hopkins was the woman star of the afternoon, winning both in the hundred-yard swim and the paddling surfboard race for ladies.

A big crowd was out at the beach to see the Outrigger aquatic stunts. In the evening a monster chowder and dance brought to a fitting close a most successful regatta.

A number of surfboard-riding events, postponed from other dates when the surf was not quite right, will be pulled off next Saturday afternoon, should there be surf of the proper kind running. There are five numbers on the program and all will be found interesting.

The results of last Saturday's program:

Paddling surfboard, boys under sixteen, Seaside Hotel to Moana Pier—C. Sims won this event by two feet, making the distance in 2:11. C. Chapin was second, and E. Peterson third. It was a pretty race, the youngsters working manfully to land the coveted gold, silver and bronze medals.

David Beats Brother Duke

Paddling canoe, six men, open event for Frank Spearlight cup; course from Moana Pier to stake off Brown's and return. Won by crew captained by David Kahanamoku. Time, 5:17. Only six feet distance separated the two contesting canoes at the finish. The winning crew was composed of the following: R. Higgins, No. 1; F. Waldron, No. 2; T. Norgaard, No. 3; C. Lambert, Jr., No. 4; Ernest Cook, No. 5, and David Kahanamoku (captain), No. 6. The losing crew was captained by Duke P. Kahanamoku, Dave's famous brother, but although Duke worked like a Trojan, his was not to be the victory.

Hundred-yard ladies' swim—Miss Josephine Hopkins, first, time 1:23; Miss Eleanor Lyser, second, and Miss Emma Tarleton, third. Miss Hopkins won by a yard. On the whole, the race was a pretty one, but Miss Lyser did not show the form she was expected to, al-

though she has won a number of gold medals in this regatta.

Two-hundred-yard men's breaststroke swim—F. Richardson, first, time 3:17; H. Harvey, second, and R. Sanderson, third. Richardson won the race in a "walkaway," finding the water easy on his feet.

Sims' Crew Wins Canoe Race

Paddling canoe race, boys under sixteen, six boys, Seaside Hotel to Moana Pier. This event was won by the crew captained by Chesterson Sims, time 2:20. Sims' paddlers won by three feet in an exciting finish from the crew captained by Ernest Cook. The winning crew was as follows: P. Chapin, No. 1; L. Smith, No. 2; E. Young, No. 3; R. Burbard, No. 4; F. Mooney, No. 5; C. Sims (captain), No. 6.

Paddling surfboard race for ladies, Seaside Hotel to Moana Pier—Miss Josephine Hopkins, first, time 2:20; Miss Helen Martin, second, and Miss Ruth Seybolt, third. Miss Hopkins won the race easily and without much apparent effort. The second and third to finish straggled along at about equal distances.

Paddling surfboard race for men, Seaside Hotel to Moana Pier—Ernest Cook, first, time 1:47; J. McKenzie, second, and T. Norgaard, third. Cook won easily by about thirty-five yards. McKenzie and Norgaard made a pretty race of it as between themselves.

Castle's swim, one and one-half mile, more or less, from Castle's Point to the Outrigger diving stand—"Stubby" Kruger, first, with a lead of fifty yards; Carbis A. Walker, second, and Duke P. Kahanamoku, third.
