

EIGHTY-SIX ENTER FOR "Y" AQUATICS

Thirty-three Swimming Events Scheduled For Wednesday and Friday Coming

Wednesday and Friday evenings of the coming week will see another great swimming and aquatic meet at the Y. M. C. A., tank. The meet has been sanctioned by the local branch of the A. A. U., and attempts will be made to break a number of existing amateur records. There are altogether thirty-three events to be pulled off—fifteen on Wednesday evening, and eighteen on Friday evening.

The swims will be for men (including boys) and women (including girls). There are sixty-five entries in the men's races and twenty-one in the women events, making the total entry list for the meet eighty-six.

Among the men swimmers the more prominent are Duke P. Kahanamoku, Ludy Langer, Harold Kruger, John Keli, Carbis A. Walker, David Kahanamoku, R. K. Fuller, John Kealoha, John Kua, Frank Cunha and William Kananani. These men alone would make any swimming meet anywhere a huge success.

Best Women Swimmers Entered

Some of the best women swimmers in the Islands will compete, among the more favorably known being Helen N. A. Rosa, Josephine Hopkins, Lucille Legros, Edith and Thelma Kenn, and Eleanor Lyser. While Palama will be represented in the women's races there will be absolutely no representation by Palama in the men's events. This accounts for the failure of the name of Clarence Lane to appear in the list of entries given below. It was said yesterday that Harvey Chilton, coach and trainer of the Palama boy swimmers, was opposed to any of his charges entering in any Y. M. C. A., meets. At the "Y" no one knew of any reason why Chilton should act in the manner he is reported to be doing.

Short Sprints a Feature

The feature of the meet will be the swimming of distances which have not been in vogue in Honolulu, such as the forty, sixty and eighty-yard sprints and the hundred, three hundred, five hundred and eight hundred meter stretches.

Great interest will be centered in the three hundred, five hundred and eight-hundred-meter events in which Duke Kahanamoku and Ludy Langer will be rivals and competitors. These are the only races Langer is entered for, while Kahanamoku, in addition to these three, has also entered for the forty, sixty, eighty yard, and hundred meter events. Duke will also swim in the fifty-yard backstroke, hundred and fifty-yard open and the men's club race.
