One of World's Champions At  
"Y" Swims This Evening

# PETERSON IS REAL KICKER AT PUNAHOU

Wins Finally Possession of Cup  
Offered By President  
Rawlins of A. A. U.

Fred Peterson showed himself true to form in the kicking contest on Alexander Field Wednesday afternoon and walked off with the W. T. Rawlins trophy for kicking honors at Punahou.

Peterson was not able to do his kicking along with the rest Tuesday afternoon, but yesterday he came through in fine shape and far outclassed all competitors. Newton Peck was second in the contest and John Fassoth, third.

## Fails To Touch Pogue's Distance

Peterson won the punting with an average of fifty-three yards. He did not beat Henry Pogue's fifty-seven yard kick of the night before, but twice he registered fifty-five.

Peterson was also first in the kick off with an average of fifty-four and two thirds yards.

## Fails In His Favorite Work

The only place where Pete fell down was in the drop kicking, the department of the game where he has done his most sensational work in the season past. He was unable to equal Lydgate's score, but tied for second with five others. In the place kicking, however, Pete showed true to his old time form and kicked them all, tying Crozier for first place.

This gives Peterson permanent possession of the Rawlins trophy, a handsome silver cup offered by W. T. Rawlins, president of the Hawaiian Society of the A. A. U.
