

Long Distance Swimmers to Meet at Y. M. This Evening

Langer and Kruger Will Meet in 500 Meter Event—220 Yard Swim, 100 Yard Ladies', 50 Yard Open and 50 Yards for Girls Under 15 Promise to Be Features—Trials Show Every Event Will Be Close Contest—Healani Should Win Relay

Everything is set for the big meet at the Y. M. C. A. this evening, and there are enough good races to insure a banner attendance. The result of the first night's meet was entirely satisfactory to the swimming enthusiasts, and every event was an exciting one.

There are a number of feature events scheduled for this evening including the 500 meters, 220 yard swim, 100 yard ladies, 50 yard open, 50 yards for girls under 15 and the relay.

In the 500 meter event Harold Kruger will make another effort to defeat Ludy Langer. In the first two races the local boy crowded the Californian throughout the race, and although Langer swam a heady race throughout, Kruger was not far behind at any point of the race. This race should prove to be a thriller, with everything even.

In the 220 yard swim Keli and Kruger are expected to have a hard fight, although the fact that the two swimmers are entered in other events may have its effect on the result. The 50 yard open ought to be a real race from start to finish.

In the 50 yards for girls under 15 the time should be as fast as that of the 50 yard open. With Eleanor Lyser and Marion Dowsett entered, there is a possibility that a real contest will be staged at the finishing line. In the 100 yard event Gerd Hjorth and Josephine Hopkins look like the leaders, as the other swimmers have not been sent over this distance. If Marion Dowsett enters this race she promises to spring a real surprise.

The preliminary events showed that there will be real contests in the races tonight, and the dope appears to be that surprises will be the order, but according to the dope sheet they should finish in this order.
