HEALANI SWIMMERS WIN A. A. U. MEET

Mid-Pacific Carnival Aquatics Come To Successful Close

Two unfortunate incidents prevented the Mid-Pacific Carnival swimming meet which came to an end last night at the Y. M. C. A. tank, from being an unqualified success.

The first, which was a minor one compared to the second was the hooting at this or that club by young men who should have known better, but the big break came with the hundred-yard backstroke when Joe Stickney, one of the judges, disqualified Lane on some technicality—failure to touch one end of the tank with both hands. This brought a vehement protest from Harvey Chilton, the Palama trainer; hot words were used and a scrap averted by the prompt action of Ludy Langer. The whole affair was an unfortunate one and left a bad taste on what would otherwise have been a smoothly run off meet.

At a quarter past eight the first race, the two-twenty open was shot across the boards and everything went along without a hitch until the Lane episode. The meet was far more exciting than the Washington Day one and fast time was made in a number of events.

Between lulls the Waialea Band rendered music finishing its performance with "The Star Spangled Banner." Kaehu is "Dark Horse"

One of the real dark horses of the two-day meet was a young Hawaiian in Uncle Sammie's Navy—A. V. Kaehu. If ever there was a comer it is this swimmer and last night he flashed away in the fifty-yard service race under the fast time of twenty-five and two-fifths seconds, beating Pingry.

There was what one might call an international race run off when the swimmers for the fifty-yard special were announced: Ah Kin Yee, a Chinese lad, taking first place with Lukela Kaupiko, a native son, second; D. Hitchcock, third, and Ken Matsuguma, a Japanese.

The hundred-yard open went to Laff by a fairly safe margin, made so by the fact that Kelli, who finished second, had already entered in the two-twenty event. Harris finished a poor third in this event.

A feature of the evening was the novelty race which created much merriment. There were four men entered: Kahaleanu of Palama led the field by a lap with L. Kim Wai second Duke and Kaupiko were disqualified, the former because of "biting" (just what Lorrin Andrews said) Kaupiko's ear or apple, but no one knows.

This race saw apples thrown into the pool and the contestants pick them up with their mouths, swam the rest of the length of the tank and then returned the length of the pool. In the early stages Duke and Kim Wai had a general mixup.

Edith Beats Sister Kenn
In the last lap of the hundred-yard swim for girls Edith Kenn forged ahead and beat sister Thelma to the finish and Josephine Hopkins who came in third. The swimmers confined too much time in watching each other, otherwise there could be no fault found.

The fifty-yards, boys under fifteen, was a pretty race, the contestants being well matched, Hartwell Doane, Walter Chung and Lee Chong finishing in the order named. The sixty-yard swim for ladies, backstroke, was a hotly contested one between Edith Kenn and Blanche Fernandes, the former winning by a stroke. Rebecca Haabeo came third. In the hundred-yard backstroke Kruger was at his best and won handily. Lane finished second but was disqualified, Harris being awarded second place and Granrose, third.

A fitting climax was brought to the meet in the club relay of five men, each one going sixty yards. Duke won the race for the Hui Nalus in the final lap when he cut down a lead of two yards that Kelli of the Healani had and won by some three yards. Lane finished third right back of Kelli.
