

A.A.U. MEET TO BE BEST SINCE TRACK STARTED

Seven Teams Will Battle for Honors at Alexander Field Saturday; Watt to Run

With more entries received to date than ever before in the history of the A. A. U. and more teams entered, prospects for the success of the big track meet on March 30 at Alexander field are unusually bright. That there will be a record crowd on hand goes without saying, and it would not be at all surprising to see at least 3000 track followers turn out for the big affair.

The games committee has not decided what admission will be charged, but a number of the members feel that the public should be given a chance to see the meet at a low price and the admission may be set at 25 or 30 cents. This price would allow all the students of the school to be present, and would be best for the sport.

Seven Teams

The teams entering the meet this year are the Outrigger Club, featuring John Watt in the hurdles; the Pan-Pacific, Honolulu Athletic Club, Kamehameha, Waikiki Athletic Club, 25th Infantry and Marines. With seven teams fighting for places there should be some great time made and it is almost certain that the records in both hurdles will go.

One of the Outrigger men said yesterday that Watt would make the high hurdles in 15 flat and the 220 low hurdles in 24 3-5 seconds, but it is doubtful if the outrigger man can make this time, and there may be some upsets when the races are held. Watt said a few weeks ago that he would not train for the meet, and with no training there is a possibility of some one cutting in on the points.

25th the Favorite

The 25th Infantry has been picked by the majority of fans to win the meet, but it might be possible that the other teams might take away enough points to give one of the local teams a victory. The Schofield men will be especially strong in the sprints, mile, broad jump, high jump and shot put. With Watt, "Buz" Smith, Lindley, Rollins and Bromley, the O. O. C. should gather up a number of points.

Every school in the city will have representatives on the various teams, and the army will be well represented. The 32nd Infantry and 1st Infantry will have runners on the Waikiki team, and the same holds good for the men from Fort De Russy and the Kamehameha. Joe Stickney has a weight man from Fort De Russy and the Department Hospital will have a representative in Blair. With the Marines entered this year there should be much interest among the navy men.

There will be a number of feature races. The 100 and 220 should be close finishes. Smith, Wade, Stickney, Godfrey and Todd will be strong contenders in the 440, and with Robinson, Meinecke, Simonton, Chun Lee Puck, Teregawa, Benefield and Stanley in the mile there ought to be fast time.

Five Mile a Feature

The meet will be a hard one to dope out, but it may be possible that there will be some real upsets when the races are called. The five mile event and the relay will be naturally interesting, and in the long run the fans are looking for Scott, Teregawa, Shannon, Meinecke, Chun Ah Chong, Ishimura and a long distance man from the 25th Infantry to show to form.

Lieut. Beckman of the 32nd Infantry is taking an interest in Shannon's training, and the blonde runner may spring a surprise in the coming meet at Alexander field. Prisbela is another runner who must be figured as he has plenty of endurance with a spurt at the finish.

Fort Ruger Interested

Lieut. Kronk, athletic officer at Fort Ruger, will have the Rugerites, who are on the Waikiki team ready for action, and Roberts, Bishop and Womack are expected to score points. Bishop will work out a Mills school next week in the pole vault and as he has done 11 feet on the mainland, ought to be able to sail up 10 feet 6 inches next Saturday.

Capt. Nicholson of the Honolulu Athletic Club team will have a good squad out and the following stars will be seen in action with this club: Melim, Godfrey, Ferreira, Meinecke, Souza, Bertelmann and Nicholson. Peter Baron has been secured as trainer, and the team is banking on finishing right behind the 25th Infantry.

All in all it should be a real meet from beginning to end, and the teams in Honolulu who will make a fight for the second place, will have their men on edge. Bill Beebe has been unable to train for the meet, but may step
