

Punahou Track Stars Win Interschool Meet

Midkiff's Athletes Run Away in Meet at Alexander Field, Scoring More Points Than All Other Local Schools—Hilo Athletes Make Good Showing in Events—Pogue, Smith, Uwelo, Kanuha and Mahikoa Capture Track Events—Big Crowd Out

Those mighty men of Midkiff upset the Kamehameha dope sheet at Alexander field on Saturday afternoon, scoring 57 points in the interscholastic meet, which was just one point more than the total made by all of the local schools. Kamehameha captured second place with 32 and Mills and St. Louis scored 13 and 11 respectively. The athletes from Hilo high school scored eight points. H. M. A. and McKinley failed to score.

A record crowd turned out for the interscholastic and some excellent marks were made, although no record was smashed. Punahou equalled her record time in the relay, making 1:35 4-5 for the distance. The events were run off in fast time, in fact it might be said that they were carried out much faster than was good for all of the athletes.

On the Cinder Path

Howard "Buzz" Smith was one of the outstanding stars of the day. He captured both the furlong and 440, and in addition ran a beautiful race in the relay, beating out Kan Leong by inches in the final spurt to the tape.

Henry Pogue upset some of the St. Louis, Mills and Hilo dope when he romped away with the century. The Punahou all-round star got off well and beat out Lu Bun Hee in the race for the tape. Pogue should have an excellent chance to carry off honors in the coming A. A. U. meet. He looks like one of the best all-round athletes developed in Honolulu in some time.

Uwelo showed the track fans that his injury did not slow him up and he ran a beautiful race in the 880. Had he been pushed a little more at the finish he might have smashed the record held by E. Deverill. Hitchcock proved a surprise by beating out Singlehurst.

Kam had counted on eight points in the shot put, but Hanohano of St. Louis upset the dope by taking second from Kauhane.

"Smiling" Kanuha and Robert Simonton startled the fans by their treat race in the mile. Kanuha made the best time ever recorded by a Kam runner, finishing the long run in 4:55 3-5. Many thought Simonton started his sprint a little too early, but at any rate he made a great race of it, and should give Kanuha a hard rub the next time out. Many believe that these two runners will show Robinson and Meinecke some real racing next Saturday.

Mahikoa upset the Kam dope when he beat McGuire out in the hurdles. McGuire ran a pretty race throughout and was not far behind at the finish.

Edward Ha showed up best for the Mills team in the mile. Teragawa was strong in the early part of the race,

but lacked the speed to carry him home. Francis Bowers ran a pretty race, and the same may be said for Forbes, who surely made faster time here than at Hilo.

Tang of Hilo was the fastest man of the visitors in the sprints. He made a good race in the 220 and was right up with the leaders in the 100 yard event. He scored three points for his team. Forbes gathered two more; E. Silva added two in the hurdles and the relay gave the Hiloites a total of eight.

Many believe that after his performance of yesterday Smith will give Joe Stickney a hard race in the 440 next Saturday. Stickney had made close to 50 seconds, and Smith ought to cut down his time somewhat over that of Saturday. Inasmuch as there may be heats in the 440 and the fact that Simon and one other 25th Infantry man is going in the 220 and have been clocked in 22 3-5, Smith may decide to keep out of the furlong and go after Stickney. If Smith does this he ought to be right close to the Pan-Pacific start at the finish of the quarter mile.

Fred Peterson did not go after a record in the pole vault, when he won at 11 feet. Coleman made a great showing and has ideal form in the event. He should show vast improvement and many believe that he will have to be figured in this event next Saturday. Kam Leong took care of the broad jump in excellent style, beating out his nearest opponent by more than a foot.

Pogue showed his versatility by tying with Peterson in the high jump. He first showed promise last year, and in addition to being an all-round track star, like Dower, is a football and baseball player.

Members of the Waikiki Athletic Club scored 24½ points in the interscholastic meet Saturday. The Kam school scored 32 points and the members of the Outrigger track team scored 28½. These three teams will be represented in the coming A. A. U. meet. Pogue, Kan Leong, You Bun, Mahikoa, Simonton, Luis, Willis and Tin Fook beat out Kam and the Outrigger with Peterson, Smith and others.

Noble Kauhane, Weston Dower, Joe Stickney, Thomas Hore, "Scotty" Gibb, Harold Godfrey, Bill Meinecke, Harry Bertelmann and other old track and field stars were on hand to watch the meet. Frank Fernandez was on hand, but will wait until next Saturday to show his worth.

Wilbur Rogan, who is slated to run in the dashes next Saturday was out looking them over. Harold Godfrey of the Honolulu Athletic Club said yesterday that he would protest Rogan, as he maintains that the baseball player has no right in the meet.
