

TRACK MEET TOMORROW TO BRING OUT 231 CINDER PATH ATHLETES

Largest Entry List in History—Volcano Run First Boosted Track Athletics in Territory—Ten Mile Race and Six Mile Relay First Started By O. O. U. Officials—25th Infantry Should Beat Out Honolulu Club in Big Meet Tomorrow

By far the largest entry list in the history of track athletics will be seen at Alexander field for the big track meet tomorrow afternoon at 1:30. Altogether 231 athletes will be entered for competition. There is much interest in track athletics this year, and to the O. O. U. and the Waikiki Club is due the major credit for the inter-places. John Watt, if he is in shape.

To begin with the Volcano run was the big event of the year, and first brought track athletics to the front. Joe Stickey, H. N. Mosher, A. E. Wyman, A. E. Given, Will H. Stone, L. W. de Vis-Norton, George Murskaki, Fred J. Hamilton, Alexander Hume Ford and other O. O. U. members were the men interested in making the meet a success. All Hilo witnessed the race.

Real Meet

Then on count No. 2 came the ten mile race which was witnessed at various points by 10,000 people. This was once more handled by the O. O. U. members. At that time some of the sour boys mentioned the fact that this race should not be staged as it would kill the A. A. U. meet. None other than Rudolph J. Smythe, president of the O. O. U., was chairman of the games committee.

It was an officer in the O. O. U. and a member of the Waikiki Club that suggested to the carnival committee that relay races be staged during the carnival. Once more the cry was raised that such an event would injure the A. A. U. meet. Yes, and if injured it so much that 231 entries were listed, which is double the amount that has ever asked to compete in a previous meet.

Get Letters Right

These are facts that cannot be denied, and although the O. O. U. has never been modest in the past, it must be taken into consideration that this organization has done much to improve athletics here. The Waikiki Club, Asahi, Outrigger Club, Pan-Pacific and other organizations have already come under the guidance of the organization which has put track athletics on a real basis in Honolulu. And please don't get the first two letters wrong. It was the O. O. U.

What the future holds in track athletics will rest with the showing made by the various clubs at the meet Saturday. The Outrigger Club is peeved, the Pan-Pacific ditto, the Waikiki, like the 25th Infantry is NOT entirely pleased, and although it is sincerely hoped that none of these teams will drop out of the meet, there will be some work by the O. O. U. following the meet.

Rudolph J. Smythe is at present working on a surprise for the meet tomorrow. He is confident that it will go through in great shape. Last Saturday the O. O. U. staged a real hit, and according to the plans there will be a big surprise on Saturday.

Who Will Win?

As to the winner of the meet tomorrow it seems to be a case of take your choice. One enthusiast will pick the 25th and the other will take the Honolulu Club. But it would be a surprise if the Outrigger, Waikiki or Pan-Pacific would take first or second away from one of these teams.

One of the men on the Honolulu club said yesterday at Alexander field that 70 points were too many for his club. He said that the Honolulu club would not make over 55 points. Another Honolulu club man said 65 points would be about the ratio. The 25th Infantry wants 60 or 70 points. This won't leave much for the Outrigger, Pan-Pacific and Waikiki. Kam is certain to break in somewhere, at least in the 880 yard run.

Watch Outrigger

After all some of the teams may receive a rude awakening. The men who have picked the various men to win may receive an upset, and it would be wise to figure the Outrigger club in the running. The men in track athletics must not forget that tomorrow this aggregation may spring some surprises, and the same holds good for the Waikiki club.

There promises to be some good races in the dashes with Melin, Simon, Smith, Given, Corn, Hore, Dowser, In Bun Hee, Kan Leong, Kausha, Fernandez and others. Rogau and Herring will be out of it. The quarter promises to be another real fight with Stickey, Smith, Wade Melin, Todd, Skinner and a number of others entered.

Kanaha will be out of the mile but Melnecke, the favorite with many, will run, and Robinson, Simonton, Chun Lee Puck, and others will fight for places. John Watt, if he is in shape should win out in the hurdle events, but may decide to enter at the last moment to run for a place.
