

# OUTRIGGERS LOSE TO KAKAAKO TEAM

The closest and most interesting game of the season in the Honolulu Volleyball League was played last night between the Kakaako and the Outrigger teams. The Outriggers took the first set, 15 to 13. In the first part of this set the Kakaakos led. In the second part the Outriggers took the lead and in the twenty sixth inning the score was thirteen-all. This set was a long one, it taking thirty one minutes to decide the winner.

The second set looked like a walk-away for Kakaako, as Ah Fo, who replaced Naone, ran up the record score of one serve, making nine straight points, with the players behind him right on their toes and the Outriggers going to pieces.

At the end of the tenth inning the score stood nine to one in favor of Kakaako, and then the uncertainty of volleyball was proven, for the Outriggers, after the Kakaakos had made two more, began to score, with eleven to two against them, and held the Kakaakos while they scored seven points, cutting down the Kakaako lead to two points and then tying the score, thirteen all, again in the twenty sixth inning, as in the first set.

## Outriggers Lost Fine Chance

Poor playing and several costly errors lost the Outriggers their one last chance and the Kakaakos won out, fifteen to thirteen. The last set also went to Kakaako although it was a toss up in the early part, the score being eight all in the sixteenth but from then on the Outriggers seemed to lose their grip and went to pieces, losing nine to fifteen.

Ah Fo, who replaced P. Naone in the second set, played a fine game, as did E. Apau, Raymon and the rest of the team, but Coleman was the star of the evening and it is to his strong and vigorous playing that Kakaako owes her victory.

The Outriggers played a great game in spots but at times their playing was very ragged. They also made a mistake in taking out Willard instead of one of the other players.

## Jarrett Beats Army

The last game of the evening was between the Headquarters, Second Infantry, and the O. P. A. C. in which the Headquarters bunch dropped two straight to the O. P. boys, 15 to 10 and 15 to 5. The feature of this game was the way the army boys swept the fast O. P. team off their feet in the early part of the game, running up a score of nine to two. It was then that the O. P. players braced up and from then on had everything their way.

For the Headquarters Brosch was the star and the way he can cut the ball when he gets it close to the net is some class. Van Pelt played a good game, as did McClurg and Wedemeyer.
