

# BIG FAIR CARD IS TRACK-FIELD MEET

## Tomorrow Afternoon Set Aside For Sprint and Distance Foot Runners

The stage is set; the athletes are on edge, and everything is in readiness for tomorrow afternoon's great A. A. U. track and field meet of the Territorial Fair at Kapiolani Park. The first call for the meet will be given at a quarter after one and fifteen minutes later the first event, the 100 yard dash trials, will be run off.

The twenty-five events on the afternoon's program, including the trials, should be over by five o'clock, if the program is adhered to, and it looks as if the officials will stick to the letter of the agreement.

The principal competing teams, one of which is expected to win the meet; are the Waikikis, under the direction of Weston Dower, captain; Thomas More, coach, and "Doc" A. E. Wyman, manager; the Twenty-fifth, managed by Maj. Eugene J. Carr; the Outrigger Canoe Club, handled by "Dad" Center, and the Honolulu Athletic Club, directed, it is understood, by Oliver P. Soares. There are a number of army teams in addition to the Wreckers, but they are hardly figured on as possible winners of the meet.

### Chance Here For Dopesters

The Twenty fifth won the March A. A. U. annual track and field meet, leading the Waikiki Athletic Clubs by only a few points. They are out again to repeat, but the Waikikis believe they can turn the trick this time, which will be their second appearance, since the organization of the club, at a meet.

"Let them all talk," said John Watt, the leading Outrigger athlete, yesterday, discussing the meet, "the Outrigger is stronger now than it was at the last meet and we expect not only to beat the Waikikis but have a certainty almost that when the points are counted at the end we will be leading the bunch."

The Honolulu have also a strong lot of athletes and in the calculations for tomorrow they, too, should be figured in the running.

The prizes are a gold medal for first, silver for second, and bronze for third place in each regular event. A silver cup will be given to the team making the most points at the meet.

When the entries were closed some time ago it was learned that 401 athletes had been entered, the total entries, allowing for the same athlete in several events, totaling over 800. Howard N. Mosher, chairman of the committee in charge, together with his fellow committeemen, managed at a meeting of captains, managers and coaches held a few days ago, to have the entries reduced, so that no club is actually entering, under the new order of things, more than four athletes in any event. This has reduced the number of athletes to slightly over 200.

The action of the committee, acquiesced in by the team representatives, has insured the running of the meet in scheduled time, it is believed, and as a result it will be all the more keenly competed and better appreciated by the audience.

The officials for tomorrow's big meet will be announced definitely today. They will be practically the same who officiated at the annual A. A. U. meet at Alexander Field, Punahou, last March.
