Watt (25th), presented Melin for second place, Simon winning handily.

Two hurdles also required two trial heats. In the first John M. Watt broke the record by a fifth of a second, while in the finals he was followed by Kelly (25th), Parton (25th), and Neil (4th Cavalry).
