

Speedy Meet Goes To Men of 25th; Nine Records Shattered

Various Athletic Clubs No Match for Schofield Speed Merchants—Outrigger Second, Honolulu Athletic Club Third, Waiikiki Fourth—Ferreira, Watt, Melim, Watson, Carolinus, Lindley, Coombs, Robinson and Simon Bright Stars

New Hawaiian Record Established

60-yard dash—T. C. Melim, Honolulu, 6 2-5 seconds.

The 25th speed merchants plunged over, under, around and through the best cinder athletes that Honolulu and vicinity had to offer last Saturday and carried off first honors in the big Territorial fair track and field meet with the staggering total of 109 daubers. Second place, went to the tracksters of the Outrigger Canoe Club with 26 points and the Honolulu Athletic secured third money with a puny total of 19. The handsome cup donated by the Pan-Pacific club went to the winning outfit.

From the 100-yard dash, which opened the meet, the final issue was never in doubt, for in this event the 25th speedsters showed that they were in shape, and when this aggregation in shape it takes some combination to wallop them. First places were secured by the winners in every event except the high hurdles, low hurdles, 60-yard dash, pole vault, five mile and high jump.

The feature race of the day was the five-mile grind and this event was one of the few that fell to the lot of a civilian, Ferreira of the Honolulu Athletic club winning the event in record time, 28 minutes 22 3-5 seconds. The work of John Watt of the Outrigger club in the hurdles, Cliff Melim in the sprints, Lindley in the high jump and Peterson in the pole vault is worthy of more than passing note.

As for Maj. Carr's lads, there is not much chance of segregating the stars from among them. Suffice to say that the 25th has the strongest track team in the history of the islands and a combination that would make a good showing in most mainland meets. It is hardly fair to this wonderful aggregation to single out stellar performers—rather let us call it an all-star team!

Without a doubt Saturday's meet was the snappiest cinder classic ever staged in the Pacific and to the officials in charge of the affair and the club managers all credit is due. They know their business. Below may be found the vital statistics:

Manuel Ferreira surprised everyone but himself when he stepped out and won the five mile heart-breaker. This bird retired from the running game an even twelve years ago and the meet of last March was the first appearance of the new five mile champion since that time. Ferreira is a heady runner and in addition has an unlimited supply of fight. Hats off to him!

Carolinus, the big moose that hurls the weights with telling effect for the 25th, was the big point-winner Saturday, amassing a grand total of 15 daubers all by his lonely, besting the island record in the shot put and making good marks in the hammer and discus. The great work of the men of the 25th in the weights was due in no small measure to Lieut. Sutor.

The work of this man Simon in the 220 was a revelation to the local sporting fraternity. The lengthy speedster rambled through the furlong in the record time of 22 1-5 seconds, which is good enough time for any man. As well as this bit of record-breaking Simon ran the last lap for the half mile relay team which smashed the island record in this event.
