Gil Canario a Bear

Gilbert M. Canario, the Signal Corps center, was easily the star of the regular match, he alone scoring 15 baskets from field and three from foul for a total of 23 points. Sweier, the Signal Corps left forward, was also much in evidence, landing nine baskets from field for 18 points. The remaining six points for the Wigwaggers were scored by Tybach, right guard; Clinton, right forward, and McCluskey, left guard, each landing a basket.

W. O. Watson, right forward, accounted for six of the eight points scored by the Department Hospital team, two baskets from field and two from foul going to his credit. The other two points were scored on a basket from field by R. Dodge, left forward.

In the exhibition game Levenson, right forward, landed five baskets from field and two from foul for a total of 12 points, being closely followed by Malone, left forward, who came in for five baskets from field and one from foul for 11 points altogether. The other two points for the All-Stars were made by Rankin, center, two baskets from field for four points, and Aiman, one basket from field, for two points.

Kenneth Decker, right guard, was the star for the Outriggerites, landing five baskets from field for 10 points. Auerbach, right forward, made two baskets from field and two from foul for a total of six points. The other points were made by Johnson, center, on two baskets from field, and Nottage, left forward, one basket from field.

All-Stars—Levenson, right forward; Malone, left forward; Rankin, center; Aiman, right guard, and C. C. Williams, left guard. Williams' passing, by the way, was the prettiest and most artistic of the day. It was easily the real spectacular feature of the play.

Outrigger—Auerbach, right forward; Nottage, left forward; Johnson, center; K. Decker, right guard, and H. Tarvey, left guard. Mouse Smith went in for Nottage in the third quarter, and his place was taken later by Fritsch.
