

# SEA-DOGS NOSE OUT COAST GUNNERS IN AN EXCITING BASKETBALL BATTLE

Two Doubleheaders Staged Over Week-end at Moiliili Park by Oahu-Service Basketball League—College of Hawaii and Outriggers Winners in Their Games

Although there were two cracker-jack games of basketball played during last Saturday and Sunday out of the four staged by the Oahu Service League, there was hardly a score of fans out to witness the battles. In Saturday's contests the College of Hawaii defeated the 1st Hawaiian Infantry, 40-14, while the Marines beat the Coast Defense squad, 30-23. Yesterday's matches brought out one good game and that was between the All-Stars and Signal, Corps, which resulted in a victory for the latter team, 28-17, while the Outrigger bunch defeated the Department Hospital, 52-7.

Coach Crawford of the College of Hawaii had a speedy team that went up against the 1st Hawaiian team of Fort Shafter. The players showed marked improvement. Kan Leong Chun, Raymond Kong and Hanohano were among those who helped defeat the 1st Hawaiians decisively. Kan Leong especially, did stellar work for the team.

The best game of the week and series was that of the Marines and Coast Defense teams on Saturday. Both teams fought hard and there were many stars who did splendid work. The score of 30 to 23 indicates that there was a hard fought game. In the first half the Coast Defense men led by a score of 17 to 15 and it was during the last quarter of play that the sea dogs won the contest.

Malone, guard of the losers, was the bright player of the day. He was all over the field and often had to guard three men at a time. Wells also did some good work but Levenson, who starred a week ago, failed to come back to his usual form, although he scored the most number of baskets for his team.

On the other hand practically every man on the Marine team starred. Every man played up to form and their accuracy in judging passes and basket shooting were the features of the day.
