

OUTRIGGER GRID TEAM LOOKS GOOD

Thumbnail Sketch of Former Stars Who Will Pull Off Comeback Stunt

Chances for a brilliant gridiron year are unusually bright for the first season of the Outrigger Canoe Club football team. This is the first time that the beach club has entered a football team in the league, and the eleven will be watched with interest by fans of the city.

Many gridiron stars of former days will be seen in action when the beach outfit takes the field in the first encounter. Stars from Punahou, Kamehameha, H. M. A., Yale, McKinley and practically every outfit that has ever played in Honolulu are trying out for the team.

A short synopsis of some of the more shining lights is given here.

Thumbnail Sketches

Capt. Bill Inman, formerly of Punahou and captain of the championship eleven from that school in 1913. Inman has played at tackle and behind the line, and has shown good stuff in all of his appearances. He is a heavy man, and will probably hold down the job of full on the Outrigger team. Inman's last appearance in moleskins was in 1916 when he played tackle on the championship town team.

Frank Rodrigues, who has starred at end for the town team and the First Hawaiian Infantry, will again be seen at his old position at left end. Frank is a hard player, and a star end. He is good on the offense and defense, and a nifty man with his toe also.

Bill Thompson, formerly of McKinley High. Thompson captained the team from that school a few years back, and since then has held down tackle position on the Town Team. He is a hard and sure tackler and is a power on the offense.

Oh! Gilbert, is There

Gilbert Canario, who played a star half on the H. M. A. team three years ago, will be out for his old position. He also played on the Signal Corps team, and it was here that he gained a reputation for being a hard hitting back.

George Quintal, Punahou quarterback about six years ago, is out for that position again. He is a very good punter and drop-kicker and will add a needed punch to the team.

George McInerney held down guard and tackle positions on the Punahou team playing on the same eleven with Inman. He is a good lineman and uses his six feet six to good advantage.

Herbert McInerney, another one of the McInerney boys, and just as good as his brother. He outweighs him and although he has not played here for some time, is a good lineman, having starred in the line for St. Mary's College, Oakland.

Llewelyn Hart is a graduate of the McKinley High, and while attending this school held down guard for four years.

Pat O'Sullivan has had all of his experience with the various town teams, and has shown himself to be a good lineman.

Claud King played tackle on the Punahou team four years ago, but since then has not had much football work.

Bill Paty Among Those Present

Bill Paty is another graduate from Punahou. He is a husky lineman and has shown in former appearances on local teams that he is still good. He



is another graduate from one of Midkiff's teams.

Herman von Holt played tackle on the Yale University team two years ago. He was a star in the East and has been seen on local gridirons but one season, when he played on the "Y" team.

Tom Singichurst is a young star who made his name on the light Signal Corps team last year. He held down end and, although outweighed, played an excellent game. He should make a better showing now that he is on a team that is fast and has weight behind it.

Don Brown is another exponent of the Midkiff coaching system and, according to Honolulu fans, is a very good one. After playing end for Punahou he joined the Signal Corps. Here he blossomed out into one of the fastest and best backs in the league. He played a star game on a losing team, which is something that every one cannot do. Out of the army now, Brown hopes to keep up his good showing and he has every chance to do this.

Tom Cockett is an old back. He learned the game out in Kaimuki at the H. M. A. Although he was never on a good team while out there he showed himself to be a sure ground gainer and when he graduated from the academy he was drafted into the Town Team where he made good.
