

# NO SENIOR GRID SET THIS YEAR

## ALL HOPE OF LEAGUE ABANDONED

Although no definite football league has been formed among the senior grid teams of Honolulu, quite a lengthy schedule has been arranged by the respective managers of the different clubs. E. O. Hall & Son have agreed to contribute a trophy to the winning organization provided the various clubs participate in some sort of league. It is practically assured that there will be at least five teams who will be contenders for gridiron honors this year, namely: The College of Hawaii, Outrigger club, Town team, Luke field and Schofield. These five clubs are absolute certainties as they have been organized and training for at least a month. As to a Coast Defense organization little is known whether or not the various forts will turn out teams from their respective outfits or form what would be known as a Coast Defense team, a consolidation of Forts Ruger, De Russy, Kamehameha and Armstrong. It is hoped that the formation of such a team will take effect within the course of a few weeks as it will greatly add to the interest of the sport to have enough army teams to compete against the civilian clubs of the city.

From all accounts the Schofield bunch are fast rounding into a formidable aggregation and some classy contests are in store for the fans when this outfit clashes with the various city elevens. Little has been heard about Luke field but as they are scheduled to meet the Outrigger club on the 16th of November it is surmised that they are in training for the contest and will undoubtedly be in first class shape for the game.

The Town team led by "Scotty" Schuman has managed to get enough men together after a period of a couple of weeks of hard recruiting, and are practising daily in preparation for the coming season. From the bunch that Schuman has collected, Clarke and Arona, former Kam stars, appear to be the two best bets on the new organization. However, Schuman is optimistic as to the coming season, and is pretty sure that when the two best teams get together on New Year's day for the final championship game his outfit will be on hand to uphold the championship honors.

"Piper" Rodrigues, who was slated for the end position on the Outrigger

team will not participate under the colors of the Canoe club this season. He has decided to cast his lot with another organization.

Arrangements for the Outrigger club-College of Hawaii game have not been completed. Although they are scheduled to meet on the first of November there seems to be some doubt as to where the game will be played. It was originally planned to play in conjunction with the Punahou-McKinley game at Mollili field, but unless the authorities of the four teams get together and decide as to what constitutes a reasonable division of gate receipts for the preliminary game, the College of Hawaii and the Outrigger club will play their game either on Alexander field or Cooke field at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. This would give the fans an opportunity of witnessing both games at different fields, as the school game would not commence before 3:30 p. m. As there are hundreds of fans who are supporters of the Outrigger club and the College of Hawaii, it is hoped that both games will be played on the Mollili field in order to bring out a record breaking crowd.
