

OUTRIGGERS AND COLLEGE OF HAWAII BATTLE TO SIX TO SIX TIE AT PUNAHOU; PENALTIES CAUSE COLLEGIANS TO LOSE

Dusky Brash Stars For Hawaii's With Numerous
Long Runs and Line Plunges—Canoe Club
Men Lack Fighting Spirit

THE major football season was ushered in on Alexander Field yesterday afternoon when the Outrigger Club and the College of Hawaii played a 6 to 6 game. The game was slow, many penalties being inflicted and the College coming in for a great majority of them for off-sides.

Dusky Brash was the College star, running the ball around the end for several long gains, and plunging the line for several good yardage. Bromley and Harvey also played a good game on the defense for the Collegians. Thompson at end also stopped the majority of the Outrigger runs in great fashion and gives promise of being a strong end in the future. All of the Collegians showed up well in their first mill.

The Outrigger team seemed to lack the fighting spirit that goes with a winning aggregation, and played listless ball in the first half. They came back strong in the second and redeemed themselves. Canario, Hart and McInerney played well for the Outriggers.

The game opened with the College receiving the ball. After three attempts to advance the ball they punted and the Outriggers returned the ball to the College forty yard line by a series of punts and passes. However, the College showed the better team work and outplayed the Outriggers and the ball was in the latter's territory for the most part. The first quarter ended with the ball on the Outrigger forty yard line. A long forward pass, Harvey to Hitchcock, netted the Hawaii's thirty yards. Then after several attempts to puncture the line, Dusky Brash, captain of the College eleven, carried the ball across on a skin tackle play. A punt out was necessary, and was successful, but Spencer failed in the try for goal. The Outrigger received but lost the ball and the College began another march up the field. Spencer, Bromley and Brash gained in turn placing the ball in the middle of the field. Then Brash brought the crowd to its feet with a sensational run of fifty yards. With the ball on the Outrigger's ten yard line the time-keeper's whistle ended the half saving the Outrigger Club from another touchdown.

Penalty Loses Game

The second half opened with the Outriggers receiving. They came back strong, and forced the ball up the field. They were forced to punt and the College safety fumbled the punt. He recovered but was downed in his tracks. The Outriggers broke through on the

next play and smothered an attempted punt, falling on the ball on the College's twenty yard line. Here it was that the College lost the game, for they were penalized for off side play on four separate occasions, some of the penalties having somewhat of a hazy appearance. Then with the ball on the College two yard line, they held for three downs but on the fourth were again penalized for an alleged off side play, and with four downs to score it took the Outriggers all of them to do it. On the fourth attempt Quarterback Hart carried the ball through the left side of the College line for a touchdown. Canario failed at goal. Score, 6-6.

The fourth quarter opened with the ball on the College forty yard line. The Outriggers pushed the ball up the field but were halted. Then the College took a turn at advancing the ball and did so. Canario was forced to punt from behind his own goal line, making a poor kick of it on the first attempt, but again the off side penalty was inflicted on the College and on the next attempt he made a good punt. The ball seesawed back and forth for the remainder of the game with the advantage somewhat in favor of the Outrigger Club, but neither team being able to score. The final whistle ended the game with the ball on the College thirty-five yard line.

The game was clean throughout and few injuries marred the progress of the game. There were no penalties inflicted besides the ones for off side which shows that the game was clean and hard fought.

The College and the Outrigger Club will meet again on Saturday afternoon November 8, at 2:30, at Moiliili Field.
