

CANOEMEN OVERWHELM LUKE FIELD BY 27 TO 0

Flier Eleven Unable To Score
Against Fast Outrigger
Team

LOSERS PLAY POORLY AND LACK TEAMWORK

Passes and Kicking Feature
Beachcombers' Game; Many
Players Injured

BY A score of 27 to 0, the football team of the 6th Aero Squadron of Luke Field went down before the eleven of the Outrigger Canoe Club yesterday afternoon at Moiliili Field. Lack of teamwork, misplays and fumbles at critical moments by the fliers was responsible for their defeat. The Beachcombers kept the ball most of the time in their opponents' territory and never once allowed them near the army goal line.

The Outriggers made their first score a few minutes after the opening of the game. The aviators caught Canario's kickoff on their 20-yard line, made three through center and then kicked. Outrigger ran the ball back to the army 25-yard line, made three around right end and then sent Brown, tackle, through a big hole in the army line for a touchdown. Canario kicked goal. Outrigger 7, Luke Field 0.

In the second half, Hollinger caught Canario's pass made from the army 40-yard line and ran to within one yard of the goal line before he was downed. A moment later, Canario himself, carried the ball across the line for a touchdown and then kicked goal. Score: Outrigger 14, Luke Field 0.

Long Forward Pass

Nearly at the close of the third quarter the Beachcombers scored again. Canario made two forward passes to Willis, one of which was a beauty for about 25 yards, bringing the ball to the army 11-yard line. After two downs had gained only two yards Stickney was sent around left end for a touchdown. Willis punted out and also tried for goal but missed. Score: Outrigger 20, Luke Field 0.

The final score came about two minutes before the end of the game when Canario shot a forward pass to Willis who caught it on the 10-yard line and carried the ball over, making the touchdown squarely behind the goal post. Willis himself kicked the goal. Score: Outrigger 27, Luke Field 0.

The Beachcombers made nearly all of their gains on forward passes or end runs, very seldom trying line bucks. Their teamwork was far ahead of that in the game with the College of Hawaii a week ago. Most of their trick plays were well executed and usually gained ground for them. The army, on the other hand, played old-fashioned football but never was able to gain when gains meant scores. Beagle's kicks were low and short and were frequently intercepted, while Canario kicked low and high and his forward passing was especially good.

Injuries Numerous

There were numerous injuries and changes in lineup were frequent especially in the army team. Hollinger, the Outrigger's big fullback, played the second half of the game with a bad shoulder because there was no one to take his place. Canario had a narrow escape from serious injury when he was tackled low near the sideline and somersaulted, landing squarely on his neck. A few moments later Falk, wing, and Stickney, Outrigger half, collided with a thud which could be heard all over the field, just as Falk had made a nice catch of a forward pass. Falk was unable to resume play.
